

TWO ATHLETES GIVE MECHANICS BIG EDGE

Bill Loving and Eddie Tolan Collect 23 of 29 Points Needed for Victory—Northwestern, Defending Champion, Disappoints by Trailing Kalamazoo Central by Lone Point With 17-

Ann Arbor, May 22.—Cass Technical High school of Detroit overcame three varieties of opposition—human, atmospherical and underfoot—here today in the taking of first place with 29 points in the twenty-sixth annual University of Michigan interscholastic track meet.

YPSI TEACHERS RETAIN TITLE

Michigan Normal Noses Out City College in Annual Track Title Meet.

Vault, Javelin Marks Pass Off Exceeded; Discus Record Tied.

East Lansing, May 22.—Michigan Normal, by scoring in every event but two, today won the Michigan interscholastic track and field meet and appended the state collegiate championship for the fourth consecutive year.

Detroit City college surprised the prophets by moving out Michigan State variety for second place, Hilldale finished fourth, Western Normal fifth, Michigan State sixth, and Albion seventh.

The team scores were: Michigan Normal, 43-2; Detroit college, 42-3; Michigan State variety, 40-2; Hilldale, 31-1; Western Normal, 22-3; Michigan State fresh, 11-2; Albion, 5.

A heavy track precluded the shattering of any sprint or distance records, but two field marks fell and a third was equaled. Horace of Western Normal, went 12 feet 8 inches to retie the old pole vault mark of 12 feet 7 1/2 inches. Bartlett of Albion, tossed the javelin 135 feet, smashing the old record of 132 feet 3 inches. Alvin of Ypsilanti, set up a new discus record in the preliminary round of the meet Friday of 128 feet 8 inches and tied that mark to win the event in the finals.

Although his team finished behind two others, Alderman, Michigan State's speedy triathlete, excelled by winning three events, the 100 yard dash, the 200 yard dash and the broad jump. Spence of Detroit City college, won the 200 yard hurdle and placed in the 200 yard dash. Others who shone in were Roberts, City college, George, Hilldale, Simon and Otto of Ypsilanti and Hines, Michigan state. Michigan Normal won by putting a well balanced effort into the competition. Cold winds prevailed throughout the meet and nullified the effects of the usual warming up process. In fact, the man who could run fast enough to keep warm was a rare article today. Shivering was fashionable and unavoidable. Friday's rain did not spoil the track, but the jumping pits were soggy and the grass runway for javelin throwers very slippery.

Hotly Helped Kalam.

Next to Cass came Kalamazoo Central, Northwestern of Detroit was third, one point behind Kalamazoo, the latter leading 18 and 17, respectively. Kalamazoo gained second by scoring more points in the half-mile relay, the last number on the card, than Northwestern. Tilden Technical of Chicago, winner of the race, broke a record which had endured for 13 years. Tilden's time was 1:21.74, three-tenths of a second faster than that of University High school of Chicago, holder of the former record, made in 1913.

Cass is indebted to Eddie Tolan. The 19 points representing two first place and three second place points up in the 100 and 200 yard dashes was a noteworthy contribution to make its victory more convincing. Charles Ross, Northwestern sprinter, did no better than fourth in the century.

Flint Is Fourth.

Other scores were: Flint 14, Grand Rapids 12, Tilden 11, Detroit Northern 10, Saginaw Arthur Hill 9, Detroit Eastern 8, Holly 5, Macomb 5, Ann Arbor 4, Pontiac 3, Detroit Central 2 1/2, Detroit Western 1 1/2, Lansing 1.

Cass assumed a lead with the second event and increased that lead with almost every event, having a 17-point lead over Northwestern, their Detroit rival, winner of the Detroit city meet, and 15 points ahead of Kalamazoo Central, who finished third in the last two events to win second, the same place they took in the indoor interscholastic meet.

Tilden helped pull Kalamazoo into second place in the relay and produce the points that put the western Michigan team in second place ahead of Northwestern. In the effort to establish Tilden's runner, Kalamazoo's quarter got more speed out of their legs than ordinarily. Their time for second was better than Northwestern's which had won the first section of the race since were determined on a time basis and Kalamazoo, running in the second section, and coming in Tilden, was more than a second faster than Northwestern.

Mile Is Disappointing.

While the condition of the track was good, considering the amount of rain that bombarded it the night before, the runners were hand-

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capped. Yet the drawback did not stop Kingsford, Grand Rapids South, and Criger, Pontiac, from battling it out until the final furlong.

Criger went into the van at the gunshot and met every challenge of Kingsford until the last 220 yards. Kingsford, over that vital stretch, had the most power left in his underpinning and his sprint carried him to the front where he stayed until the tape was reached.
