Class A Prep Teams Run In Preliminaries Friday

Elimination Scheduled for Afternoon With Finals Saturday Morning—Annual Inter- scholastic Track Battle to Center About Three Leading Teams

The opening skirmishes for the Michigan High School Athletic Association Class A track and field championship were scheduled for the Michigan State College Field Friday afternoon. Preliminaries in all the field events, hurdles and dashes were on the program with the finals booked for Saturday morning at 9 o'clock. The preliminaries were to start at 4 o'clock promptly Friday.

The list of entries follow:

Detroit Northwestern, Kalamazoo Central, Detroit Cass Tech, Detroit Central, Detroit Northern, Detroit Southwestern, Detroit Eastern, Flint, Highland Park, Ann Arbor, Lansing, Battle Creek, Saginaw Arthur Hill and Eastern, Muskegon, Grand Rapids, Southfield, Detroit Southeastern, Detroit Western.

Detroit Northwestern, perennial winner of the Class A honors, will be in the field to out-point Kalamazoo Central and Cass Tech of Detroit for the title. With Cass Tech and Kalamazoo both placing ahead of the Colts in the annual University of Michigan interscholastics last Saturday at Ann Arbor, it appeared that Northwestern will have a stiff battle with every indication of being ousted from the top of the heap.

Kalamazoo was not reckoned with by dopsters in early season through the west state team placed third in the annual indoor meet at Ann Arbor last winter. His school's strength has been the feature of the Class A season this spring and its chances for victory are excellent, according to those who saw the Kazoos at Ann Arbor a week ago.

It is not expected that any of the records will be seriously endangered by the invaders although competition will be keen practically every number on the program.

Lansing will have a goodly number of athletes entered but they are not expected to step into the point column to any extent. Ed. Killoran, captain of the Big Reds, placed fourth at Ann Arbor for the only point garnered by Lansing. Killoran has not reached the top of his form in any meet thus far and may step out for honors Saturday. Durst in the sprints, Young in the 330 yard run block in the half-mile are the remainder of the Lansing men who have shown best form this season.

With star athletes entered from Sweden, Germany, Italy and other European countries, the National A. A. U. track and field championships at Philadelphia in July will take on a truly international flavor.
