

HAVE A GAME GIVEN TO

NORTHROP SETS THREE OF THEM

University of Michigan Star Takes Javelin, Broad Jump, and Pole Vault.

Six state track and field records were surpassed, three of them by one athlete, in the Old Timers' Athletic Club first annual meet on Belle Isle, Saturday.

The new records, established were in the one-mile relay, the 220-yard low hurdles, 440-yard dash, the broad jump, pole vault and javelin throw. The last three marks were made by Phil Northrop, the University of Michigan star. Edward Spence, of City College, competing for the Old Timers, bettered his own state mark in the low hurdles. John Lewis, a student at Northeastern High, took four-fifths of a second from the state quarter-mile mark, while the Detroit Athletic Association team broke the mile-relay time.

High point honors in the meet went to the Old Timers by a margin of one point over the D. A. A., the former scoring 24 points to 23 for the group of Negro athletes running as the Detroit Athletic Association.

ERROR LOSES MEET

But for an error in entering one athlete, the D. A. A. would have topped all others in team scoring. Eddie Tolan of Cass Tech., was permitted to enter the meet as a post entry. He entered himself as unattached. A little later his entry was made by the D. A. A., but Referee Charles D. Lynch ruled that Tolan would compete unattached in the 100 and 220-yard dashes, both of which he won.

Northrop entered three events, winning first and setting records in all. He tied for high point honors with Kenneth Doherty of City College, each having a total of 15 points. Doherty was first in the high jump, second in the shot put, discus throw and javelin throw and third in the 120-yard high hurdles.

Northrop's three performances were by far the best of the meet. He leaped 22 feet 10 inches in the broad jump, six and a half inches farther than the state record he set at the 1925 Michigan A. A. U. games. His vault of 12 feet was seven inches higher than the previous state mark held by Percy Prout of the University of Michigan.

HIS GREATEST TOSS

The U. of M. all-around star climaxed his day's performances with a heave of 208 feet 10 inches in the javelin throw, adding 30 feet 5 inches to his own state record of 178 feet 5 inches made last year. The distance was the best ever made by Northrop who holds the javelin records for both the national intercollegiate and the Western Conference meets.

Spence ran the low hurdles in 24 4-5 seconds, taking a full second off his own state time. He fell down, however, in the high hurdles losing out to Don Copper of the University of Michigan, running unattached. Copper took the high barriers in 16 seconds flat.

Lewis defeated Everett Pauschert of City College, the state record holder, in the 440, incidentally taking four-fifths of a second from Pauschert's time, Lewis' winning mark being 51 seconds flat. The D. A. A. relay team, composed of two Cass Tech., one Northeastern and one City College runners, ran the mile in 3:35 2-5 as against 3:37, the state record, held by the Young Men's Order.

SCHEDULE OTHER MEETS

Besides the Old Timers and the D. A. A., the other clubs to place in the scoring were the Y. M. C. A. with 13 points and the Y. M. C. A. with 6. Most of the college athletes entered in the meet competed unattached.

It was announced that the Old Timers would conduct two other meets, one on July 17 and the other on Aug. 28. The annual state championship games will be held on Belle Isle on July 5.

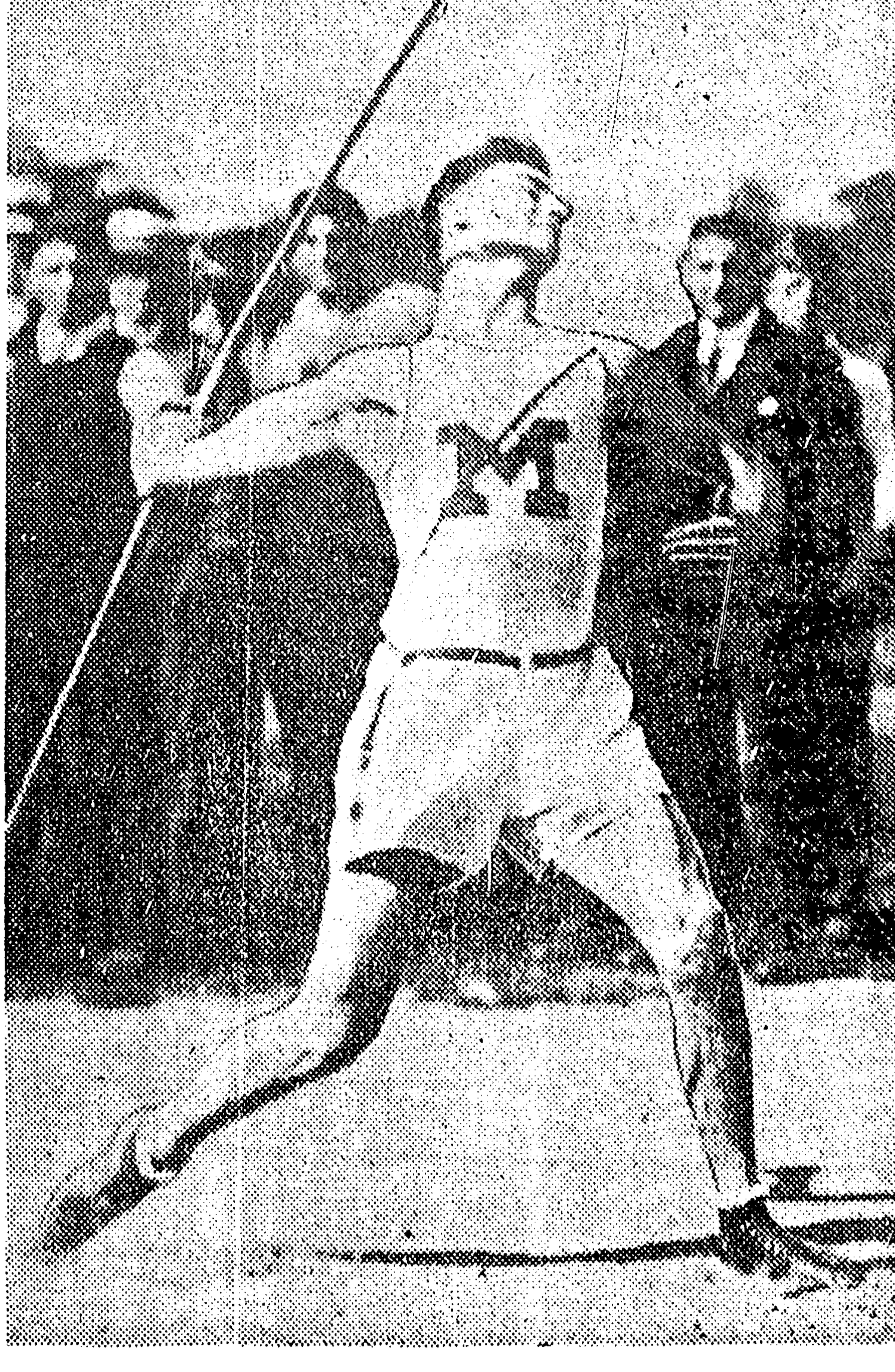

INJURED ANKLE DECIDES TITLE

Mrs. Johnson Slips and Slip Carries Tennis Match to Mrs. Riese.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., June 20.—Mrs. L. C. Johnston, of Detroit, woman's state tennis champion, lost her title here today when she was forced to default to Mrs. Ruth Riese, of Saginaw, because of a badly sprained ankle sustained in the fifth game of the third and final set in the women's singles finals in the Michigan State Tennis Tournament. The score of the match as played was 7-5, 1-6, 3-2.

The accident occurred with the score standing at deuce. The Detroit woman, in a desperate effort to reach a placement, allowed her racket to become twisted between her legs. She tripped and crumpled in a heap.

Mrs. Johnson took the first three games in the final set. Her opponent then adopted safe tactics and attempted only to force Mrs. Johnson into error. She had scored twice when the accident ending the match occurred.

Both women displayed the generalship that comes after long experience in tournament play. They played the baselines, awaiting opportunities to rush to the net for a kill. Mrs. Johnson's injury will keep her from playing for several weeks, physicians stated.

Emmet Pare, of Chicago, defeated his fellow-townsmen, George Jennings, Jr., in a grueling five sets match in the finals of the men's singles. The match score was 1-6, 6-8, 6-1, 6-4, 7-5.

Jennings had all the better of the play for the first two sets, but was weakened by a strained ligament sustained earlier in the tournament. Pare played a steady game that carried him to victory. In the last three sets, he chased Jennings from one corner of the court to the other.

The finals in the men's doubles which will bring together Pare and Jennings and Heaney ad Davidsoo, of Grand Rapids, will be played this afternoon.

LAUFER OUTSPEEDS GERMAN SWIMMER

American Takes Two Races in Berlin Meet.

BERLIN, June 19.—Walter Lauffer of Cincinnati, star American swimmer, who is touring Europe, won both of his first starts in a two-day athletic meet here against the best German and Hungarian free style swimmers.

Lauffer defeated the German free style champion Heinrich of Leipzig in the 200 meter swim, making the distance in 2 minutes 25 seconds. He also captured the 1,000 meter event in 15 minutes 17 seconds. Eckstein of Leipzig, was second with a mark of 15 minutes 37 seconds.

The races were in a 25-meter outdoor pool and attracted 25,000 persons. The only complaint Lauffer had was that the water was so icy that not even "a dog would swim in it in the United States."

Lauffer and Russell Webb, also of Cincinnati, will meet Erich Rademacher and Gustave Froelich and other German stars in tomorrow's competition. Rademacher and Froelich recently returned from a successful swimming tour of the United States.
