

OLD TIMERS WIN AGAIN ON TRACK

Close Season by Easy Victory In Belle Isle Meet; Y. M. O. Second.

Old Timers' Athletic Club closed a successful outdoor track season at Belle Isle Saturday by scoring its third team victory of the season.

The meet, which was the third of a series staged, it seemed, for the special benefit of Old Timer athletes, marked the close of Detroit's most successful outdoor season. There were four outdoor meets held this summer. Of these the Old Timers won three and tied for first with the Young Men's Order in the other.

WIN BY 40 POINTS.

Saturday's victory was the most decisive the Old Timers have scored this season. They scored a total of 78 points as against 38 for the Y. M. O., the runner up, and 36 for the Detroit Athletic Association. The other organizations to score points were the Y. M. C. A., 8; Illinois Athletic Club, Chicago, 5; University of Michigan, 5, and Danish-American A. C., 2.

The I. A. C. points were scored by a victory of Ray Watson, former national A. A. U. and intercollegiate half-mile champion and a member of two American Olympic teams, in the half-mile run. Watson defeated Tim Ryan of the Y. M. O., the M. I. A. A. and State A. A. U. champion, by a margin of less than five yards. Ryan led the Chicago star until the last turn when Watson sprinted and led the way to the tape.

THIS ONE DIDN'T COUNT.

Watson also ran in a mile handicap race in which he gave away handicaps ranging up to 200 yards. He finished third. This event did not count in team scores.

Al. Thorp, competing for the Young Men's Order, sprung a surprise in the pole vault by defeating Percy Prout of the University of Michigan. Thorp, who had vaulted for Michigan State Normal College during the school year, tied with Prout at 11 feet 9. Neither, however, was able to clear the bar at 12 feet and the bar was again lowered to 11 feet 9. Thorp cleared on his first jump while Prout failed.

With his brother, Eddie, the state 100 and 220-yard champion, unable to compete because of illness, Hart Tolan, ordinarily a half-miler, ran in the two sprint events for the D. A. A. He won the century and was just barely beaten out by Herbert Allison of the Old Timers in the 220. The race was so close that many figured that Tolan had won. Others believed the event had ended in a dead heat.

LOVING WINS HURDLES.

Bill Loving, state interscholastic hurdles champion, running in his first meet of the season, won the high hurdles and was third to Edward Spence and Don Cooper, whom he had beaten in the highs, in the 220 low hurdles.

Del Allman of the Y. M. O. captured both the shot put and discus throw, while Lee Barrett of Alblon, competing for the Old Timers, won the javelin throw with 181 feet 10 inches.

Pat Blanchard of the Old Timers, the only record breaker of the day, set a new mark of 58 1-5 seconds in the 440 hurdles. The former time, a second slower, was made by Merle Weaver, who ran third Saturday.

FAIR GROUNDS RACE LIMITED TO 14 CARS

100-Mile Event Will Bring Small Autos Here.

Officials in charge of the 100-mile automobile race, which will be held at the Michigan State Fair Sept. 11, announced Saturday that the field will be restricted to 14 cars. They also predicted that among the starters would be several of the country's prominent drivers who will come to Detroit following the Altoona, Pa., race on Labor Day.

Like the race held last June, the event has the sanction of the A. A. A., and W. D. Edenburn, representative of the contest board, will be in charge of qualifying trials and the race.

Cash prizes totaling \$13,400 will be distributed to the successful drivers. Promoters of the race claim this sum equals any ever given in this country for a 100-mile dirt track race. The winner will get \$4,000, second \$2,800, third \$1,800, fourth \$1,200, fifth \$900, sixth \$800, seventh \$700, eighth \$600.

HARRIS BLAMES BUSH AND WALTER RUETHER

Says They Kept Washington Out of First Place.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Dutch Ruether was sent to the New York Yankees for the waiver price because of his continual breaking of training rules, Washington baseball experts said today as the pitcher left to join his new team.

In the opinion of Manager Harris, Dutch hasn't gives his best to the club recently. Bucky Harris thinks Dutch's failure in the last month has kept his club out of a ranking position in the first division, as he thought Joe Bush kept it out of first place earlier in the season.

Bush, like Ruether, broke training rules. His unconditional release from the Nationals followed.
