

Northeastern Runners Tie For National Title

Detroit School Deadlocked With Lagrange High; Second Guess Robs Northwestern Swimmers; Colts Second on Track.

EVANSTON, Ill., March 26.—Detroit high schools made a determined bid for first honors in both the track and swimming events in the national interscholastic meet here today, Northeastern tying Lagrange on the track with 13 points, and Northwestern losing a tie in the water meet on an official's second guess in the fancy diving contest. Northwestern was second in track, with 12.

The first announcement in the swimming meet was that Northwestern of Detroit had tied Wilmington, favorites and last year's champions, with 23 points. After a consultation, however, it was decided that an error had been made in the last event of the day, the fancy dives and Palmer of Wilmington was moved up from third to first place, giving Wilmington an additional three points.

DETROITERS STRONG.

In the tracks events both Northwestern and Northeastern high schools showed great strength. Northwestern won the relay by 20 yards from a field of three rivals. Their time of 2:48 4-10 gave them a good margin.

Beatty of Northwestern, broke the meet record when he won the 880 yard run in 2:01 7-10, almost four seconds faster than the mark set by Stocking, of Rockford, in 1923. Beatty had no competition, and finished pulled up more than 15 yards in front.

TOLAN TAKES DASH.

Beatty was nosed out by Tolan, of Cass Tech, in the 50 yard dash, who stepped off the sprint in :05 3-5, just short of the record. In capturing first and second places the Detroit dash men proved to be the class of the large field of over 70 runners who completed yesterday for the right of entering the finals today.

RITOLA NO MATCH FOR WIDE'S SPEED

Swedish Runner Conquers Willie in 2-Mile Race.

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, March 26.—(AP)—Edvin Wide, the Swedish schoolmaster, decisively defeated Willie Ritola, Finnish-American veteran, and Willie Goodwin, of the New York A. C. tonight in a two mile race featuring the United Swedish Charities' track meet, but failed to break the world's indoor record.

Harold M. Osborn of the Illinois A. C. world's champion high jumper, turned in the best performance he has shown in his specialty this season, when he leaped six feet 5 1-2 inches to win this event. He failed in three attempts to set a new indoor record of six feet 6 5-8 inches.

Gall Robinson of the New York A. C. cleared 6 3 1-2 to gain second place and Chapley Major of St. Bonaventure College was third at 6.1.

STAR OARSMEN PAIRED

Two clever oarsmen of the Pennsylvania Barge Club, of Philadelphia, are about to start pair-oared rowing in order to win the right to represent Uncle Sam in the 1928 Olympic regatta at Amsterdam. They are Bill Miller and Charles Karle of the club's 1925 national champion senior four and eight.
