

COLT ATHLETES TOP QUALIFIERS FOR CITY MEET

Northwestern Places in Every
Event and Leads all Rivals
With 19 Finalists.

ONE RECORD ERASED

Turaschoff, of Cass, Better
Shot Put Mark by One
Foot and a Half.

Northwestern advanced a step closer to another high school track championship yesterday afternoon by qualifying 19 event entries in the preliminaries of the seventh annual city meet at Codd field.

If there is strength in numbers, the Colts should retain the title they have held since 1921 as Northerners and Northeasters, counted upon as the most formidable opponents, failed to match the Northwestern athletes in the final event.

Northeastern, mainly through the showing of Hearty, national half-mile champion, qualified 11 event entries. This number was one less than Northerners, and three better than the schools represented the said. Westerners qualified 11, while Cass Tech will have five in the final. Southwestern, Eastern and Northwestern each came through with four, and Detroit and Highland Park trailed with two.

Turaschoff Sets Mark.

Of the 14 schools entered Strathmore Central, University City, Detroit High and Hammond failed to place athletes in the final. There was little competition except in the 220-yard dash and low hurdles, where extra heats were necessary to determine the qualifiers.

In the 200 yard event the honor of carrying the only record of the preliminaries went Turaschoff out the shot of feet 18 inches to better the mark established by Glenn Carlson of Northwestern in 1926, who made a shot of 2-4.

In some of the other events was a record approached because of the hurrying that separated the outstanding athletes in various events, but from the showing made there is not to be a general assault on the existing marks in the final this afternoon.

Cass Does Well.

Aside from setting a new distance in the shot, Turaschoff also topped the field in the javelin with a throw of 147 ft 10 1/2 inches, a new that is 18 feet below the record, but still sufficient to win him top position.

With the support that the Detroit star is certain to get from Eddie Evans and Smith in the track, Cass is not to be a strong contender for the defending championship.

Tolan fell by 1-10 of a second to equal the one mark for the one-way race to set the field and the 100 was timed in 19 2-5 seconds, but met with a setback when Russell of Northern, established the best time for the 220 in doing the same thing in 19 1-2 seconds. With one challenge in the century and 220 and in face of Russell's performance the starting sprint should be one of the best events in the final.

Another time that made his presence felt when Smith, rated the best half mile in the city with exception of Hearty of Northwestern, easily marked past the field in 2:07 4-8.

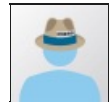
Hearty Stands Out.

Northeastern's hope of debarring Northwestern was given added impetus by the ability of Hearty in matching the best mark in three events. He topped the field in the high hurdles with a mark of 16 4-8 seconds and duplicated in the low hurdles in 12 2-5 seconds, both of which Hearty indeed secured the first records. Following that showing he also led the broad jumpers with a leap of 17 1-2 inches.

Let's team mate of Hearty, failed to come through as expected, though he never was prone to win the best of the quartet since though

Dant, captain of the Northwestern team, set the best time which was 52 2-5 seconds.

Dant's running in the quarter mile was the one bright spot in Northwestern's showing, though it qualified men in every other event. It is on this balance together with strength in the mile and relay, for which no trials were held, that the Colts are depending to retain the title.

Northeastern, Cass, and Northern are favored to carry off a majority of the individual titles, but lack the secondary point winners to vie with the Colts. Northern furnished the best hammer thrower when Mortenson led his rivals with a throw of 113 feet 8 1-2 inches and Russell created the best time in the 220-yard event.

Talent from the other schools was scattered widely and it will be case of individual stars competing against well balanced combinations to decide the championship.
