

Northwestern Wins State Track Title

Scores 29 Points, Two More Than Northeastern
—Flint Central Places Sixth in Meet at East Lansing—Tolan Beats Campbell in Century With Mark of :09 8-10—
Hathaway Boosts Vault Mark

EAST LANSING, May 28.—(AP)—Three Detroit high schools, topped by Northwestern, led the scoring of the 21st annual Michigan interscholastic meet here today. It was a meet of not unusual performances, except for the running of four different meets on the same track.

St. Joseph led the class B contestants, Plainwell had a large lead in class C, and the new class D was won by Clinton, also by a one-sided score.

Detroit Northwestern made points in 10 of the 14 events, amassing a total of 29 points. Detroit Northeastern with its stars had 27, two points behind, while Cass Tech had 23. Back of these Detroit schools came Kalamazoo with 22 points, a high total for fourth place.

The other Class A schools scored as follows: Pontiac, 13; Flint, 5; Grand Rapids South, 6; Detroit Western, 4 1-2; Benton Harbor, 3 1-2; Detroit Northern, 3; Detroit Southwestern, 3; Lansing, 3; Muskegon, 3; Ann Arbor, 1, and Holland, 1.

ATHLETES of St. Joseph high school had a lead of eight points over Birmingham with 32 points; the Detroit suburb having 24. Kalamazoo Normal high, the only school not a state high school, was third with 16, and Ferndale was next with 13.

Other class B scores were: Allegan, 10; Dowagiac, 10; Petoskey, 10; St. Johns, 10; Charlotte, 5; Grand Haven, 7; Mt. Pleasant, 4; Royal Oak, 4; Hastings, 3; Greenville, 2; Wyandotte, 2.

With the largest entry list of the three sections, Plainwell had the lowest score of any of the class champions with 24 points. Yale had 15 and Dearborn and Fremont 14 each for third place. The other class C scores were: Corunna, 9; St. Charles, 8 1-2; Oak Ridge, 5; Bangor, 7; Three Oaks, 6; Eaton Rapids, 5; Vassar, 5; River Rouge, 4; Clare, 3; Farmington, 3; Yondra, 3; Ovid, 3; Romeo, 3; Kingsford, 3; Rochester, 2; Boyne City, 1; East Tawas, 1; Otsego, 1.

CLASS D, with all of their records made for the first time, also had the smaller number of contestants. Trenton ran away with the section with 46 points, while Woodland had 23; Centerville, 16, and Halfway and Okemos 14. The other scorers were: Lambertville, 11; Kent City, 7; Southlake, 4 1-2; Akron, 2 1-2; Holt, 2.

Under the conditions, Hathaway of Kalamazoo, probably did the outstanding bit of work of the meet when he put the pole vault record at 11 feet 10 1-2 inches.

Other men to make new records were Tolan, of Cass Tech, with :09 8-10 in the 100-yard dash; Lewis, of Northeastern, with :50.4 in the quarter-mile run. Densus, of Northwestern, with 6 feet 1-4 inch in the high jump, while in class B, Barnhill, of Charlotte, made a new mark in the discus with a toss of 119 feet 10 1-4 inches, the longest mark of the meet in that event.

Wales Promises To Occupy Seat At Walker Bout

London, May 28.—(AP)—The Prince of Wales has promised Mickey Walker that he will attend Walker's fight with Tommy Milligan for the middle-weight championship of the world, to be held in the Olympic on June 30.

The promise was made on the Coombe Hill golf course yesterday. The Earl of Westmoreland introduced the American fighter to the prince, who asked him a number of questions about his boxing career and displayed great interest in his record.

Afterward they talked golf. Mickey asked, "How's your game today, '84?"

"Terrible," replied the prince, "but I have enjoyed it all the same. How did you get on?"

"If I get around in a hundred, I guess I will have had a good day," answered the boxer, "but Karns (his manager), is first-class — he often goes around in 80."

French Racer Sets New Mark

Paris May 28.—(AP)—A new world's record for distance covered by automobile in one hour was made yesterday by the French racing driver, Marchand, it was announced.

Driving over the Monthlery Speedway, Marchand covered 206 kilometers 558 metres (about 150 miles) in 60 minutes. The previous record is listed as 203 kilometers 725 metres.
