

25 Schools Qualify Men For Class A Prep Meet

Annual Michigan High School Track and Field
Contests Find Finalists for Today More
Scattered Than in Previous Years

EAST LANSING, May 26.—(AP) —Athletes winnowed from hundreds of their fellows in yesterday's and earlier preliminaries started competition in the finals of the Twenty-second Michigan high school track and field meet here early today.

They represented 57 schools, by far the largest number that have had representation in the finals of this event. Class A had athletes from 25 schools in the contest today while last year men from only 18 schools remained.

Class B retained representatives of 20 schools, class C of 26 while class D, the newcomer last year, was represented by athletes of 16 schools. Last year the number at the end of the preliminaries was eight.

Swiftness of the change of high school athletes was illustrated by the fact that but seven of the men who qualified yesterday in class A events qualified last year. One of these was the brilliant Beatty, Detroit Northeastern, who set a new mark by qualifying for the second year in succession in three events, the 120 and 220 yard hurdles and the broad jump.

TURASHOFF, Cass Tech, also added his name to the two events in which he qualified a year ago, the shot put and javelin throw. The other men who qualified in the preliminaries of both meets were Nelson, Grand Rapids; Snowden, Northeastern, both sprinters; Goldstein, Benton Harbor, pole vaulter; Dennis, Northwestern and Relkin, Port Huron, high jumpers.

Class B also had seven of its last year's qualifiers present after the struggles of yesterday. Three sprinters, Davis, St. Joseph; March, Petoskey and Lyons, Birmingham, returned to the 100-yard event where they contested last year while Davis and Lyons retained places in the 220. Simms, St. Joseph, won places in the broad jump and 440 each year while Briney, St. Joseph, placed each time in the pole vault.

Four second year men found their way into class C. Salerno, Yale, winning a place in the 220-yard dash and the broad jump as he did a year ago; Earle, Plainwell, qualified again in the pole vault; Rhody, Iron Mountain, in the discus throw and Allen, Clio, in the 220 yard dash.

Good track conditions greeted the contestants in the preliminaries but a cold wind curbed the usual storm of record breaking and made times in the dashes and hurdles rather slow.

Present Month Proves Prolific One for Bambino

New York, May 26.—(AP) —The month of May is proving to be one of the most prolific Babe Ruth has ever experienced in all his years of campaigning after bigger and better home run records.

Smashing out two home runs in the second game of yesterday's double header with the Philadelphia Athletics, the mainspring of the Yankee's attack brought his season's total to 16, all but four of which have been hit this month.

Since 1919 when he set a new record of 29 home runs in a single season, the Babe has hit more than 12 home runs in a month on only four occasions.

His two circuit drives yesterday put him seven games and six days ahead of his schedule last year when he hit 60.
