THREE FIRSTS TAKEN BY FALCON HURDLER

Cass Tech and Grand Rapids South Tie for Second with 17 Points, 15 Behind Leaders—St. Josephs, Yale and Okemos are Other Class Winners—Flint Gets One Point.

EAST LANSING, May 26.—(AP)—Detroit Northeastern's track team, small in numbers but mighty in power, added the title of Michigan Class A track and field champions to that of national indoor champions, here today.

The Falcons scored 32 points in showing their heels to Detroit Northwestern's six-time title holders, and to Cass Tech, 1927 winners.

Cass Tech and Grand Rapids South tied for second place with 17 points, while Northwestern collected 15 for third.

Other Class A schools finished as follows: Detroit Western, 11; Kalamazoo Central, 10 1-3; Lansing Central, 9 1-5; Detroit Eastern, 7 1/2; Muskegon, 6 1/2; Redford, 6; Holland, 5; Benton Harbor, 3 1-3; Grand Rapids Otawa Hills, 3; Port Huron, 2 1/2; Ann Arbor and Pontiac, 2 each; Jackson, 1 1/2; Detroit Southeastern, Flint Central and Saginaw Eastern, 1 each.

EUGENE BEATTY, Northwestern's national interscholastic low hurdle champion, was the outstanding figure of the meet. He was high point man of the meet, including all four classes, scored three first places and ran a leg on the winning relay team. His 15-point contribution was nearly half of his team's total.

Nelson, of Grand Rapids South, cut into Northeastern's scoring when he ran away with the 100 and 220-yard dashes. Snowden, of Northeastern, was figured as the winner in both events, but finished second in the century and could do no better than fourth in the turlong. The performance of Turashoff, of Cass Tech, who won the shot and javelin events, setting a new mark of 165 feet 1 inch in the latter, was responsible for his team's high position at the finish.

Three other marks were eclipsed. Sampson, team-mate of Turashoff, leaped 6 feet 3/8 inch for a new record in the high jump, and Arnold, Detroit Western, clipped more than a second from the half-mile mark when he covered the distance in 1:59.9. The former record was 2:01.5, set by Kendrick, of Mt. Clemens, in 1925. Swartz, of Kalamazoo Central, ran the mile in the record-breaking time of 4:32.2.

ST. JOSEPH, last year's champion in Class B, and Dearborn, put up a great struggle, with the former winning by one point, 23 to 22. The Class C battle was not so close, Yale with a well-balanced team, running up 28 points, to 17 1/2 by Paw Paw, which finished in second place.

OKEMOS easily took the Class D title, collecting 27 points, to 14 1-5 for Lawton, which edged into second place.

Fourteen records were bettered by athletes from schools in the two lower classes. Five were broken in Class C, and nine were replaced in Class D. The marks in Class B remained good.
