

COLT ATHLETES CAPTURE SEVEN FIRST PLACES

**Break Two Records and Amass
66 Points to Triumph on
Heavy Turf.**

RIVALRY ARE FAR BEHIND

**Eastern Gains Second Honors
With Cass Tech Squad
Close Third.**

Northwestern's Colts came back with a vengeance in the city track and field finals yesterday afternoon to once again occupy the high place which was theirs until Northwestern's unexpected interruption last year.

In a drizzle that prevailed all afternoon, making Codd field's track soggy and slippery, the Colts for a change turned mudders and romped through to seven first places, two new records and piled up 66 points to carry off their sixth championship.

There was little or no competition given Northwestern, which left the entire field straggling far behind. Eastern by virtue of its three places found itself the runnerup with 24 1/2 points, closely pursued by Cass Tech with 21.

Redford Ties Record.

Redford tied one record and won another first place to finish fourth with a total point score of 18. Northeastern, last year's champion, pulled up with 11 points, the only other school to amass more than 10 points. Southeastern barely nosed out Westerners for the next position when it scored seven and a half points to the former's seven. Central and Southwestern broke in to the list with four and three points respectively, while Highland Park and Hamtramck each came in with one marker. U. of D. High and Northern were the only schools that failed to gain a place in any of the events.

Despite the interference of the weather man, a number of fine performances were turned in both in the field and on the track. The discus mark of 119 feet and two inches of Carlson of Northwestern, which withstood the attack of aspiring athletes since 1924, was among the first to go into books of former records when Hibber, Northwestern's 1929 star, hurled the plate 123 feet and 3 1/2 inches.

Pair Break Record.

Dennis, who gave Northwestern the record in the high jump in 1927 at five feet, 11 inches, cleared the bar at six and one-half feet to defeat Lewis, of Eastern, who was a favorite in this event. But Dennis must share this honor with his teammate, Ward, who duplicated the feat and tied for first place.

Fograce of Eastern dealt the Colts' hope of a victory in the mile run a severe blow when he covered the distance in a record breaking performance that left the field far behind. His time of 4:36 bettered the mark set up by Keop of East.

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ern in 1927 by 10 3/5 seconds. Hurd, Northwestern's star miler, found the pace too fast and was forced to accept second place. Carr and McManus of Redford took the next two positions.

After giving Northwestern a victory in the 120-yard high hurdles, Heston, who was by far the best track performer of the day, made a strong bid to lower the low hurdle record held jointly by Ross of Northwestern and Hearty of Northwestern. Had the track been in a fat condition, Heston today would be the lone holder of the mark, instead of sharing it with two others.

Heston and his teammate, Ward, provided one of the closest races of the meet, when both ran neck-and-neck until the last few feet when with a sudden burst of speed, Heston won the hurdle event by barely an inch in the fast time of 13 2/5 seconds.

Northwestern's squad is one of the smoothest combinations noted in some years, boasting equal strength in the field and on the track. The well balance of the Colts was very much in evidence in yesterday's meet. The team took four first in the field and three on the track and the same number of second, third and fourth places in both departments.

Eastern, although it captured but two events, the shot put and mile run, proved to be a consistent second place winner. Watson was the runner-up in the dash and the 220, while Dittrich gave the Indians two second places in the field.

Northwestern, whatever strength it may have possessed last year in winning the championship, certainly did not have that old punch and its best efforts were to gain one first, one second, a third and a single fourth place.
