

EASTERN HI WINS REGIONAL HONORS

Quakers Score Victory in Track and Field Meet Held at Flint Saturday

HOFF STAR OF MEET

Lansing Central Finishes in Third Place Quail Men for Finals

FLINT, May 20.—Lansing Eastern will have 12 athletes and a relay team entered in the state interscholastic track and field meet at Flint tonight, which will be the first of the season as a result of the regional meet held at Fort St. Vrain last Saturday afternoon. Coach

Coach's Quakers will be represented at every event on the program. Coach of Coach Spelman's Central High aggregation also won the right to compete in the state meet, the Big Red's equipment representatives in 7 of the 14 events.

Quakers Score Heavily
Eastern piled up 50 1/2 points to win team honors at the regional meet without difficulty. The Quakers won both the lead in the second race of the afternoon and were never headed thereafter, maintaining a comfortable margin throughout the rest of the meet. Flint Northern was second with 25 points while the Big Red accumulated 25 points for third honors. Eastern counted in every event while the Vikings were blanked five times, four of which were in the field events.

Francis Hoff, Eastern's sophomore sensation, was again the individual high scorer. He collected 14 1/2 points by winning both hurdles, taking first in the high jump and placing third in the board jump. Paul Lovgren, of Flint Northern, was second with 10 points as a result of victories in both sprints. Carl Kenneth Wins of Central failed to win a place suffering from a painful hip injury in the 100, his favorite event.

Several noteworthy performances were turned in during the afternoon, both in the track and field events. Roger Keith had a beautiful race to capture the 400 at Central in 5:12 seconds. He was in third place on the track stretch but passed two rivals on the turn and hence the sage a few yards ahead of O'Griffin, of Flint Northern, who defeated him a week ago. Skidmore, of Eastern, moved out a distance man at the finish to take fourth.

The 800 was another great race. Reader, of Flint Northern, made a remarkable sprint the finish to win the event in 2:02 after a grilling battle with Richardson, of Flint Central. Captain Bennett crossed the finish line about five yards behind Richardson to give Eastern third place.

Flint Northern's speedy relay team captured a thrilling race in 1:34.6. Lansing Eastern kicked over the dope after finishing a poor fourth last week. Johnson ran the first leg for the Quakers and Schimwe was in fourth place when he took the baton. He passed Wernstedt, of Central, and Hoff started on his lap in third position. Hoff ran an excellent 200 yard leg, but the Flint Central runner and Williams kept pace with Lovgren in the final leg to finish a good second.

TRAGEDY MARKS YANKS' WIN OVER BOSTON SOX

Two Are Killed and 50 Injured in Rush to Exits During Shower; Honors Are Hill

NEW YORK, May 20 (AP).—The Yankees defeated the Boston Sox 3 to 2 Sunday in a 2-inning game broken up by rain in the home half of the fifth and finally by a tragedy as a crowd of more than 40,000 surged toward covered ramps to escape a downpour. Two persons were killed in the crush and nearly 50 persons were injured.

Base coach and Lou Gehrig each hit a home run at the expense of Jack Russell. Babe's drive was his seventh and Gehrig's his ninth. Lou's drive was within the field. The other run was scored in the first on a jump to Earl Combs, an error that Gehrig's baserunner, an error that Russell had the better of in the second inning. Gehrig's pitcher allowed only two hits, but basing two, of course, were home runs. The Boston pitcher also passed three men. The game was called with two out in the Yankee fifth.

Herby Does Well
The best performance in the field events was turned in by Jack Herby who tossed the javelin 102 feet and 11 inches. It was the first time this year that the Eastern star approached the best record in the state. The javelin was thrown from in hitting the spot. Harvey with a heave of more than 120 feet won the Big Red's top place in the event. Dick, of Saginaw Eastern, won the shot put with a toss of 42 feet 4 inches, rather impressive mark. Williams, of Eastern, showed a marked improvement in his form Saturday. He placed second in the 100 and 200 and extending Lovgren to the lead in both sprints. Harvey was the only Big Red to count in the 400. He placed second in the 400. Wastkins captured the mile for Flint Northern in the rather slow time of 8:54 with Keith and Parker fourth of Eastern, taking third and fourth respectively.

Hoff took both hurdle races without difficulty, breaking the tape far in the lead in both events. Cunningham was second in the high hurdle. This race was an excellent trial for the Lansing center. Five taking third and Winknick fourth for the Big Red. In the 220-yard race, Harvey crossed the chalk line behind Hoff with Wernstedt in third place. The failure of Cummings to place in this event came as a distinct surprise.

Balmer won the pole vault for the Big Red without much effort, his winning leap being only 10 feet 3 inches. Bennett and Price, of Eastern tied for fourth. Cunningham took the event with an unimpressive toss that has shown in previous meets. Bennett, skip of the Quakers, was third. After being out of the running for a place Hoff jumped three in the broad jump on his final attempt to give the team an entry in every event in the state meet. Battle and Root, both of Port Huron, were first and second.
