

**FALCONS NOSED
OUT OF SECOND**

**Dropped Baton Costs 1928
Winners Second, Won by
Cass—Eastern Fourth.**

**Niles, Lowell and Newaygo
Win Class B, C and D Titles
as 19 Records Fall.**

East Lansing, Mich., May 25.—
Detroit Northwestern high school,
absent from the throne for a year,
sprang back into power as the state
champion in the Class A division of
the twenty-third annual renewal of
the Michigan track and field games
today. The Colts scored 38½ points
to beat the field for the prized
crown.

Detroit Cass Technical finished
in the runner-up position far be-
hind the speeding Scarlet and Gray
titular host with 15¼ points. Fate
grimaced at Detroit Northeastern,
the fallen champions, for the Fal-
cons lost the chance to finish sec-
ond when Charles Ecknovich drop-
ped the baton in his lap of the
relay thus denying his team an op-
portunity to beat out Cass Tech in
the relay. Northeastern was third
with 14.

Two members of the Northwest-
ern team are cherishing state rec-
ords as a result of their efforts in
adding to the total. George Huber
barely broke the discus record with
a toss of 127 feet, one-eighth of an
inch further than Wilson, Ann Ar-
bor, heaved it four years ago.

Ward beat out his teammate,
Thad Dennis, to set a new record
in the high jump. His leap of 6
feet, 1¾ inches eclipsed the mark
of Sampson, Cass Tech, made last
year. Two other records tumbled
from the board.

Wilson, of Muskegon, bounced 11

feet, 10 1/2 inches in the pole vault to beat the mark of 11 feet, 10 1/2 inches set by Hathaway of Kalamazoo Central in 1927. Jack Herby of Lansing Eastern, did not have so better the state record time of 17 1/2 seconds in the 100-yard dash. He made in the trials 17 1/2 seconds in the trials.

Largest Score in 20 Years.
Northwestern's total was the largest that has been scored in a state meet in 20 years and marked the seventh time in 20 years that the Grand River institution has held the title. In 1909 Muskegon scored 42 1/2 points, five more than the 37 points collected today.

Jack Herby's failure to shoot better than fourth in the low hurdles and Ward's inability to come home for points in the 120-yard high stroke kept Northwestern from at least tying the record for the biggest point total. Herby stumbled over a hurdle in his race, accounting somewhat for the fourth place.

These slips, if they may be called such, were the only places in which the new champions did not live up to expectations. They scored in 10 of the 14 events, gathered five firsts, finished second in three events and had for the honor in another and had only two fourth places to their credit.

Eckmovich High Point Man.
Lever Oliver contributed 19 of the points for Cass Tech. He won both the 100 and 220-yard dashes going away from the field. Northwestern scored only one first, Eckmovich winning the 220-yard low hurdles, placing second in the 120-yard high and the broad jump. Leon Trues gave Northwestern its only three points with second in the 440-yard run. Eckmovich was individual high point winner of the meet with a total of 21, one more than Oliver.

Spectacular battles were waged by two of the champions in the other classes but both of them fell before rival teams. Ties succeeded Dearborn as titleholder in Class B.

The south state school wound up with 27 points, while Dearborn accumulated 22. Newaygo had even a more bitter battle with Okemos before the latter yielded its class D championship. Newaygo scored 22 1/2 points, the fraction being the margin that decided the title.

Six New Records in Class B.
Lewell came into the honors in Class C with a total of 15 points. The competition here was scattered over a wide range. Kalamazoo state high finished in second place with 12.

The records fell back and fast in the lower classifications. The Class B athletes showed they were with six new marks, while Class C had five and Class D four. The record breakers were:

Class B—Niles (Bath), high hurdles, 16 1/2; McNutt (Allegan), 44 ft. 10 inches, shot; Shaw (Dearborn), 25.8, 220-yard low hurdles; McKinley (Cadillac), 146 feet, 3 1/2 inches, javelin; Spangenberg (Wyandotte), 2:05.5, half-mile run; Chas (Dearborn), 121 feet, 1 1/2 inches, discus.

Class C—Truher (Kalamazoo), 85, 100-yard dash; Arnold (Charlevoix), 4:49.8, mile run; Weaver (Berrien Springs), 35.4, quarter mile run; Gosh (East Grand Rapids), 11.5, 40-yard dash; pole vault, Robinson (Lakeview), 276.5, 880-yard run.

Class D—DeWase (Newaygo), 15.9, 120-yard low hurdles, new event; Miles (Okemos), 22.4, 200-yard dash; Beaumont (Okemos), 149 feet, 4 1/2 inches, javelin; Smith (Newaygo), and Patterson (Grand Rapids Eastern), 3 feet, 5 1/2 inches, high jump.
