

Northwestern Wins State Prep Honors

EAST LANSING, Mich., May 25.—Four new champions and 17 new state records represent the results of the efforts of the athletes who competed here in the annual state track and field meet today.

Detroit Northwestern regained its Class A title, while Niles assumed the crown in Class B, Lowell in Class C, and Newago had a half point margin over Okemos in Class D.

Northwestern's victory marked the seventh time in the past 10 years it has held the title of state champions. The other three champions were Detroit schools, Northern winning in 1922, Cass Tech with Tolan and Loving capturing the honors in 1926, and Northeastern with Beatty and Snowden finishing first last year.

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their supremacy in state track circles today. The first four places went to members of the greater Detroit Inter-scholastic league, Northwestern, Cass Tech, Northeastern and Eastern finishing in the order named. Out of the 24 schools that were listed among the point winners 10 were from the Detroit league.

While most of the records established in the day's games were in the lower classes, four fell in Class A, all in the field events. George Huber, star weight man of the Detroit Northwestern team, tossed the discus 127 feet to beat the old record by $\frac{1}{8}$ of an inch. Not a very wide margin, but will be recognized by the authorities as the new mark at which discus throwing in the future must aim. The old mark was made in 1925 by Wilson of Ann Arbor.

Ward, a negro star of Northwestern of Detroit, jumped over the bar at 6 feet 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches to put a new record into the books. Sampson of Detroit Cass Tech held the old record of 6 feet 3-6 inch made in the meet here last year. Dennis was second to his team mate in this event.

MUSKIE STAR WINNER

Wilson of Muskegon is new holder of the pole vault record. He went over the top at 11 feet 10 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches, $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch better than the height reached by Hathaway of Kalamazoo Central in 1927. Hernley of Lansing Eastern failed to better his toss of 171 for the javelin that he made yesterday, but his mark will be entered in the books, and he was awarded first place today.

Jack Heston and Charles Eknovich again split honors in the hurdles. Heston put Northwestern's lead in the very first event on the programme by dashing over the high barriers in 16.2 to lead the field. Eknovich was right on his heels but could not close the gap of one yard made in the first few seconds of the sprint.

Charles came back strong in the hurdles to give Northwestern five points. He led every step of the way. Heston stumbled on one of the hurdles, but finished strong to take first after being out of the running at the half way mark. This is the third straight major meet in which the two have divided honors in the timber-topping. Eknovich was one of the outstanding performers of the day. He finished second in the broad jump. His blunder in the relays, however, may have cost Northwestern second place in the finals standing. Running first man in the relay he got half way down the straight-away when they dropped the baton. By the time he had recovered, the race had been lost beyond redemption, but his mates finished the trips around the oval and were making up for lost ground when the tape was reached.

DETROITERS FURNISH THRILLS

Races between Detroiters furnished the greatest number of thrills. Hershey of Western and Leon Dykes of Northeastern battled step for step around the oval in the 440 with the western lad finally getting in the odd step that meant victory.

The mile run gave plenty of action to both fans and contestants. Three times the runners jumped the gun and had to be called back. Otto Pongrace of Eastern was the first to try to beat the starter and then Hurd of Detroit Northwestern and Byrne of Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills delayed the start. When the field finally got under way Byrne went into the

lead. He held it going into the last lap but both Hurd and Pongrace kept within hailing distance. After they had traversed the first quarter of the final lap Pongrace moved into first place with Hurd pressing him closely.

Going to the stretch Pongrace showed the more strength and was pulling away when he breasted the tape. Hurd took second and Byrne third the same position won in the midwestern meet several weeks ago.

A new event was added in Class C and D, 120 yard low hurdles. The times made in this event will go as records until better runners appear.

In the first game, Johnson's double after Sorrell's single followed by Gehring's fielder's choice, staked Detroit to two runs in the third inning.

Harry Rice's fumble of Metzler's single and singles by Redfern and Kamm gave Chicago a run in their half of the third.

Marty McManus kept Detroit safely in front with a home run into the left field stands in the seventh, and in the eighth the Tigers put the game on ice with a rally in which three hits netted two more runs.

Chicago scored a run in the ninth on two bases on balls and a couple of infield outs.

In the second game, Smith, although wild at the start, settled down and pitched air tight ball. He held the Sox to seven hits; the three runs which Chicago scored in the second were unearned. THIRD DOUBLE

The Sox were retired in order in the last of the ninth, although the last man to face him was the redoubtable Art Shires, the "Peck's 'Bad Boy" of baseball. Shires, reinstated yesterday, was sent in to pinch hit for Dugan and fouled to McManus for the final out.

In the 39 innings of baseball played here in two days, Detroit pitchers have held the Sox to 10 runs.
