

# 15 RECORDS CREATED

## DETROIT N'WESTERN BAGS SEVENTH TITLE

### Champions Run Off With Class A Laurels With 38½ Points—No Unusual Performances Are Turned In, Though 157 Schools Are Represented

EAST LANSING, May 25.—(By AP)—Michigan's high school athletes broke 15 records here today in the 23rd annual track and field meet. The new marks were established in three of the four classes. The meet had the most ideal weather conditions state athletes have competed under for some time.

The all-star aggregation of Detroit Northwestern ran away with the Class A section of the meet with a total of 38½ points, more than twice the points of Detroit Cass Tech in second place.

Niles, with 27 points, was leader of Class B, displacing Dearborn, last year's winner. Lowell had 15 points to lead the Class C list, while Newaygo won the Class D event with 22 points, a half point more than Okemos, the defending champion.

NUMBER of teams scoring points was the feature of the day's contests. Twenty-four schools scored in Class A, 18 in Class B, 28 in Class C and 18 again in Class D.

The meet had the largest number of schools qualify of any previous meet, 157 different institutions having athletes able to qualify in the regional meets a week ago. Teams of the upper peninsula failed to appear for the events here, however.

In spite of the number of records broken, no unusual performance graced the day's contests. Pongrace, Detroit Eastern, displayed brilliant powers in the mile and Hershey, Detroit Western, had stamina in the quarter mile. The large number of athletes and the gradual improvement of competition was the outstanding mark of the long session.

DETROIT Northwestern added its seventh victory to its command of Michigan's high school events since 1920 when it won its first meet. The Colts replaced Detroit Northwestern as the Class A champions. All the other class champions were new to first honors in a Michigan meet, this giving the 1929 event a complete list of new leaders.

Individually, the meet also was one of new first-place men. Goossen, of East Grand Rapids, in a pole vault class and Sonnenberg, Wyandotte, in the Class B half mile being the single winners a year ago who repeated here today.

Rajkoviitch, of Caro, placed second in the Class B javelin, in which McKinley, of Cadillac, set a record at 163 feet, 10½ inches.

Bentley, of Lapeer, was third in the Class C discus, won by Lauer, of Lowell, at 109 feet, 1½ inches; Martin, of Oxford, was second in the 440; Edgerton, of Cass City, was second in the 32-pound shot put; Laymon, of Flushing, was second in the pole vault, in which Goossen, of Grand Rapids, set a new mark of 11 feet, 6 inches, and Oxford ran second in the half mile relay, all in Class C.

## HAMEL'S MOUND WORK KEEPS LEAD FOR MOTOR NINE

### Joe Sets Foundry Down With Three Hits — Johnson Blanks Transmission.

Taking a day off of his regular duties as an outfielder, "Big Joe" Hamel went to the mound for Manager Jimmie Campbell and pitched Bulck No. 11 to an 11-3 victory over Stack Martin's hard-hitting colored club from Bulck No. 20, at Kearsley park yesterday afternoon.

The win kept the motor-makers at the top of the Bulck Master league, and developed the fact that Hamel can be counted upon for a regular turn on the hill. The big right hander set the foundry crew down with three singles, all of which came in the sixth and seventh frames. The first 17 men to face Joe, failed to sink their sulks into first base, but Mitchell, the third man up in the sixth, singled sharply to center field and scored a moment later, when Siner heaved the ball into center field in an attempt to stop the colored boy's theft of second.

Hamel also led the attack on Avery and Martin, punching out a pair of doubles and a single in five trips to the plate. Jimmie Campbell and Chet Lipski continued their batting streak, each getting two out of three and scoring twice. Walt Lipski worked Avery for three free tickets and scored on each one.

Out at Flint Park, Bulck No. 2 had little trouble with Jimmy Hadaway's Transmission crew from Bulck No. 40, handing the latter its second successive shutout, this time by a score of 10-0. Johnson, on the mound for the winners, fanned 10 and scattered four hits over the distance.

The third game on the day's schedule was an easy one for the championship Experimental team, which took Bulck No. 12 into camp, 7-1, at Kearsley No. 1. Lixey whiffed eight of the Sheet Metal hitters, while his mates, led by Sam Dodge, Hill and Ruhula, maced Ashenfelter and Harring for 12. Dodge's triple and two singles featured the attack.
