### DETROIT N'WESTERN BAGS SEVENTH TITLE

### Champions Run Off With Class A Laurels With 38½ Points—No Unusual Performances Are Turned In, Though 157 Schools Are Represented

AP) — Michigan's high school athletes broke 15 records here today in the 23rd annual track and field meet. The new marks were established in three of the four classes. The meet had the most ideal weather conditions state athletes have competed under for some time.

The all-star aggregation of Detroit Northwestern ran away with the Class A section of the meet with a total of 38½ points, more than twice the points of Detroit Coss Tech in second place.

Niles, with 27 points, was leader of Class B, displacing Dearborn, last year's winner. Lowell had 15 points to lead the Class C list, while Newaygo won the Class D event with 22 points, a half point more than Okemos, the defending champion.

NUMBER of teams scoring points was the feature of the day's contests. Twenty-four schools scored in Class A, 18 in Class B 28 in Class C and 18 again in Class D.

The meet had the largest number of schools qualify of any previous meet, 157 different institutions having athletes able to qualify in the regional meets a week ago. Teams of the upper peninsula failed to appear for the events there, however.

In spite of the number of records broken, no unusual performance graced the day's contests. Pongrace, Detroit Eastern, displayed brilliant powers in the mile and Hershey, Detroit Western, had stamina in the quarter mile. DETROIT Northwestern added its seventh victory to its command of Michigan's high school events since 1920 when it won its first meet. The Colts replaced Detroit Northwestern as the Class A champions. All the other class champions were new to first honors in a Michigan meet, this giving the 1929 event a complete list of new leaders.

Individually, the meet also was one of new first-place men, Goossen, of East Grand Rapids, in a pole vault class and Sonnenberg, Wyandotte, in the Class B half mile being the single winners a year ago who repeated here today.

Rajkovitch, of Caro, placed second in the Class B lavelin, in which McKinley, of Cadillac, set a record at 163 feet, 10½ inches. Bentley, of Lapeer, was third in the Class C discus, won by Lauer, of Lowell, at 109 feet, 1½ inches; Martin, of Oxford, was second in the 440; Edgerton, of Cass City, was second in the 42-pound shot put; Laymen, of Flushing, was second in the 2-pound shot put; Laymen, of Flushing, was second in the pole vault, in which Goossen, of Grand Rapids, set a new mark of 11 feet, 6 inches, and Dxford ran second in the half mile yelay, all in Class C.
