

FROEBEL HIGH OF GARY LEADS IN STAGG MEET

Indiana Prepsters Qualify 13 For Finals in University of Chicago Interscholastics—Only Seven of 28 Detroit Entries Survive.

Chicago, May 31.—(A. P.)—A band of athletes from Froebel high of Gary, Ind., swooped down on Stagg field today and made off with 13 of the qualifying places in eight events of the University of Chicago's twenty-fifth annual interscholastic track and field championships.

The Froebel aggregation, second to Fort Collins, Colo., last year in the high school division, came back today apparently equipped with what will be required to win the meet. Fort Collins, ranked as a possibility to repeat this year, brought but five men through the early tests, all of them in the field events.

Fort Collins won last year's meet largely by virtue of a sweep in the hammer throw which netted 31 points. This event, however, has been removed from the list of events.

Trio of Sprinters Star.

The 100-yard dash promises a sensational final tomorrow. Three men, Foulkes, Muncie, Ind.; Swift, of Lewis, and Clark High, Spokane, Wash., and Metcalfe, Negro star from Tilden Tech, Chicago, each flashed over the course in :09.9 seconds. The trio also qualified in the 220-yard dash, with Foulkes breezing the distance in :22.4, the fastest heat.

James Keller, of East High, Columbus, Ohio, whipped through both the high and low hurdles in con-

vincing style, but will be challenged by Kroschel, of Houston, Texas; Hardman, Grand Prairie, Tex., and Moulton, of Council Bluffs, Ia.

Northwestern Lands Four.

Mooseheart academy, of Mooseheart, Ill., winner of the title in its section last year, was favored to again win, by qualifying 10 men today. Lake Forest, Ill., academy, Culver Military academy, of Culver, Ind., and Campion academy, of Prairie Du Chien, Wis., also placed men.

Only seven of Detroit's 28 entries survived. Northwestern qualified four, Huber in the discus; Moore, pole vault; Ward, high jump, and Dennis, high jump and broad jump. Beer in the shot put and Lewis in the high jump were Eastern's two qualifiers. Ecknovich was Northwestern's only qualifier, placing in the 220-yard low hurdles.

'HURLS NO HIT GAME.

Kalamazoo, Mich., May 31.—Pitching a no-hit, no-run game, Fritz Black, Western State Teachers college, freshman, shut out the Mt. Pleasant frosh baseball nine here this afternoon by a score of 5-0. Black struck out 10 men and did not issue a base on balls. He was given splendid support by his teammates till the final inning, when three errors were scored. Black is a former State high star.
