

FROEBEL WINS NATIONAL TITLE

Gary Athletes Take First Honors in Prep Meet at Stagg Field.

Northwestern Leads Michigan Schools—One World's Record Broken.

Chicago, June 1.—(A. P.)—A world's record went tumbling, three world performances were equalled, and four marks for the meet were cracked as 600 athletes from 30 states finished competition in the University of Chicago's twenty-fifth national interscholastic track and field championship meet today.

Jack Keller, of East High, Columbus, O., after tying the world's record of :15.2-10 in the 120-yard high hurdles, came back to smash the world mark in the 220 low hurdles by scissoring his way over the barriers in 24. This performance clipped two-tenths of a second off the old record hung up by Eugene Beatty, Northeastern High, of Detroit, in 1927.

Hoodler Schools Lead.

Athletes from Froebel High, of Gary, Ind., captured the meet by scoring 42 1/2 points, with Arsenal High, of Indianapolis, second with 28. Fort Collins, Colo., winner of the 1928 meet, was third with 25 1/2. Fulton, Mo., St. Joseph, Mo., and Tilden Tech., Chicago, tied for fourth place with 22 points each. East High, of Columbus, was fifth with 16 1/2. Sioux Falls, S. D., was eighth with 10 and Central High of Muncie, Ind., Lewis and Clark, of Spokane, Wash., and Pontiac, Ill., were tied for ninth place with 14 points each. Sixty-seven teams broke into the point scoring.

Mooseheart Repeats.

In the academy section, Mooseheart, Ill., won the title for the second successive year, with 42 points. Lake Forest, Ill., 1928 runner-up, again was second with 28. Culver Military academy scored 22 1/2 for third place; Terrill, Texas, was fourth with 24, and St. Johns, Deltafield, Wis., fifth, with 14 points.

Ralph Metcalfe, sensational 18-year-old Negro sprinter from Tilden Tech., Chicago, tied the world's records in winning both the 100 and 200-yard dashes. He stopped the century in .99 8-10, and captured the 220 in 21 2-10.

Metcalfe, with Keller, were high in individual point scoring, each registering 20 by their double victories.

Meet Records Fall.

New records for the meet were established in the discus, 400-yard run, shotput and half-mile relay. William Moreau, of Fort Collins, Colo., heaved the discus 126 feet, 11 inches, to break the record by six inches, which Artie Mucka, of Oshkosh, Wis., made in 1913. Irving Fuqua, of Brazil, Ind., won the first section of the 400 in .49 4-10, clipping 8-10 of a second off the record.

Elwin Dees, of Lorraine, Kas., accounted for a meet record in the shot with a toss of 56 feet, 7 inches, while a quartette of runners from Central High, Columbus, smashed the meet record for the half-mile relay, reeling it off in 1:32 7-10, three-tenths of a second faster than the old record made by Northeastern High, Detroit, in 1927.
