

Three Detroit Boys Write Track History in Junior National

Four Records Made in A. A. U. Meet and One
Mark Tied; Metropolitan Association
Wins Team Title

THREE Detroit boys wrote their names into the record books in the National A. A. U. junior track and field meet at Olympia Saturday night. Four new records were made in the games and one existing mark was tied.

Harold Oliver, former high school champion of Highland Park and now a student at Michigan State Normal, gave one of the most spectacular performances of the evening when he crossed the bar at 12 feet 6 2-3 inches for a new record in the pole vault.

Willis Warr, Northwestern's great negro track star, and George Spitz of Flushing High School, New York, set a new height for the boys to try for in the high jump. Each hopped over the bamboo at 6 feet 3 1/2 inches.

Leroy Dues of Detroit City College tossed the 16-pound shot farther than any junior had ever done before to get his name among the great performers.

The fourth mark to go in the discard was in the 70-yard high hurdles. Jack Keller of Ohio State University topped the high timbers in :08 4-5 seconds, two-fifths of a second faster than ever before.

Don Bennett, another member of the Ohio State team competing unattached, equaled the best time ever made in the 60-yard dash. He was pressed all the way by Ira Singer, a teammate.

Win Team Title

The well-balanced team of the Metropolitan Association captured honors with six firsts, a second, a third and a fourth. Only one member of the team failed to win a place.

Detroit took more than its share of honors and topped the evening performances with a win in the medley relay over a classy field.

James Moorcraft gave the Cadillac Athletic Club its first victory by taking the two-mile steeplechase. Moorcraft led all the way and was never threatened. Art Dowhurst of Grand Rapids and Chauncey Longwhite of Detroit Y. M. C. A. staged
