

JUNIOR TRACK STARS BREAK FOUR MARKS

Detroit Youths Set Pace And Make Best Performances In Three Events.

OLIVER TAKES VAULT

Michigan State Normal Athlete Adds Almost a Foot to Old Figure.

Four National A. A. U. Junior records were broken and one other tied Saturday night at the annual running of the indoor championships at Olympia, where the cream of the younger athletes of United States and Canada competed.

The new records were established in the pole vault, high jump, 70-yard hurdles and in the shot-put. The time for the 60-yard dash was tied.

Three of the new marks were established by Detroit athletes. The most notable achievement was turned in by Herold Oliver, formerly of Highland Park, and now a student at Michigan State Normal college, when he cleared the bar in the pole vault at 12 feet 6½ inches.

Dues Scores in Shotput.

Willis Ward, of Northwestern High school, tied the mark in the running high jump, although he was tossed out for first place by George Spitz, Flushing, New York, high school boy, who set the new mark of six feet, three inches.

Leroy Dues, of Detroit City college, accounted for another shattered mark in the 16-pound shot-put, heaving the weight 46 feet 1½ inches, to better the old mark of 44 feet, four inches.

Two unattached runners from Columbus, O., turned in the best-making record-breaking and tying performances of the evening. Jack Keller set a new mark of 2:43 seconds in the 70-yard hurdles, while Don Bennett, freshman at Ohio State university, tied the 60-yard dash mark of 2:20 seconds.

In the other events the time was from one to three seconds slower than marks previously established.

Vanzko Misses Record.

William D. Menold, of Ypsilanti Normal college, jumped four feet 10½ inches to win the standing high jump, the first event to be completed. Howard Swoikert, of the Cincinnati Y. M. C. A., took second honors, failing to reach Menold's mark by two inches.

Gene Vanzko, of the Swedish American club, New York city, failed to break the world's record by two seconds in the 1,000-yard race. His time was 2 minutes and 20 seconds. Archie Yeager, of the University of Detroit, was second, giving rapidly on the New Yorker at the finish.

Victor Burskiewicz, of the Madison A. A., New York, easily walked away with honors in the 500-yard race, winning easily from Peter Schweitzer, of the Country A. C., of Cincinnati. W. W. Christie, Central Y., Toronto, finished third.

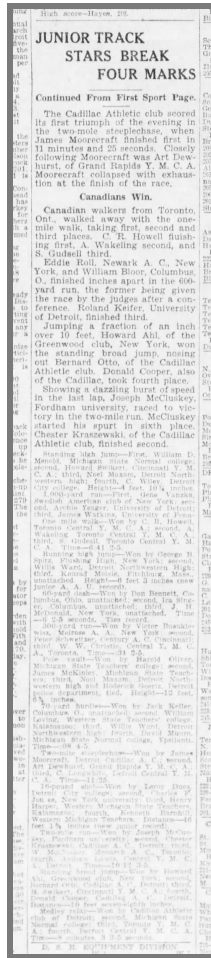
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
