

WARD LEADS COLTS TO THIRD TITLE IN ROW

Northwestern Ace Proves Star of Meet by Tying Hurdle and High Jump Marks.

FROEBEL HIGH IS SECOND

Five Records Fall During Two-Day Carnival at University of Michigan.

Ann Arbor, March 15.—Northwestern high of Detroit, for the third consecutive year, won the University of Michigan invitational track meet here this afternoon.

Largely through the stellar individual efforts of Ward, who captured both of the hurdle events and tied for first place in the high jump, the Colts were able to nose out the strong Froebel high team of Gary, Indiana. Northwestern scored 85 points against 30½ for the Hoosier team.

Five interscholastic records fell before the onslaught of youngsters, Detroit runners gaining a share in three of them. Ward, who easily was the star of the meet, in winning the low hurdles tied the time of 15 established by himself and Zimmer in winning their respective heats in the event Friday night.

Ties Another Mark.

In the high jump Ward again tied for a new mark of 6 feet 2½ inches. Glickert, of Toledo Scott high was not to be denied however, and he stuck right with the Colt star, but neither of them was able to clear the bar after 6 feet 2½ inches, which bettered the former record by two full inches.

Dykke, of Detroit Northwestern, furnished the last of Detroit boys record breaking efforts when he clipped seven tenths of a second off the former mark of 32.8 in the quarter mile. Hensley, of Western, pressed the city champion, but Dykka was up to the task and held his slight lead to the tape.

Make Fight of It.

Froebel high, which qualified 16 men for the finals, offered the other two mark shattering performances. The Blue Devils' 80-yard relay team, that cut more than two seconds off the former record in the preliminaries, lowered the time still further in the finals, with Lakewood, Ohio, forcing the Hoosiers to do 1:35 flat in order to win.

And finally, in the pole vault, the Indiana team scored a first and a second. Dykka, who held the existing mark, was forced to place second when his teammate, Womozewicz, soared over the bar at 12 feet 2½ inches. The winner barely missed clearing at 12 feet 7 inches in a later effort to better his mark.

Besides Ward's two triumphs and a tie for third victory, Northwestern scored a first in the muddy relay. Fundis captured the shot put event and Hard won the first sec-
