

Beatty Brings Track Title To Ypsi

Although Eugene Beatty is only a freshman at Michigan State Normal college the former Northeastern high school star has made his presence felt on the track, a sport in which the Teachers excel.

Saturday night at the fourth annual Michigan indoor track and field championships, the Detroit boy carried on as he did when he led the Falcons through several successful track seasons and finally almost single handed won the national track championship for Northeastern.

In this, his first college appearance, Beatty was the high scorer of the meet with 14 points. He won the 30-yard dash, the 30-yard hurdles and tied for first in the 600 yard run with the University of Detroit's leading middle distance runner, Archie Yeager.

Given the rest of this season to mature without being subjected to the rigors of too much competition Beatty should blossom out next year as the greatest track star that the Ypsi school ever has known.

While Beatty was continuing to add to his prestige, Archie Yeager, running for the University of Detroit, furnished the most thrilling race of the evening when he won the 1,000 yard run in the good time of 2 minutes and 29 1/5 seconds. At the start of the race Moorcroft, of the Cadillac A. C., took the lead with Yeager and Chapp, of the U. of D., close behind. For 500 yards Moorcroft led the field. Then Yeager started and, taking the lead, set such a pace that he was able to finish easily nearly a lap ahead of Wright, his team mate.

Kraszewski, of the Cadillac A. C. partly avenged Moorcroft's defeat by the way in which he won the two-mile run. This little runner stepped out in front at the beginning and began widening the space between himself and Quinn, of Ypsilanti, who finished second. There is an old saying that an

A. A. U. meet is never official unless some record is broken and in order to make this one "official" LeRoy Dues tossed the 16-pound shot 45 feet and 7 inches, bettering the old Junior record by 2 feet, 3 inches.

Ypsi Freshmen was the only team that made a sweep, taking the first three places in the pole vault when McKinley, Snyder and Whitney finished in the order named. The winning height was 11 feet, 8 inches, quite a little short of the record.

Ward, of Northwestern high school, and Foster, of the Y. M. C. A., also turned good marks in their respective events. Ward had little trouble winning the high jump with a leap of 6 feet and 1 inch, while Foster stopped to fix his shoe and even then was able to finish a lap

ahead of his nearest rival in the one-mile walk.

After winning the standing high jump at 4 feet, 9 inches, Maxam, of Northwestern high school, attempted to break his own record of 4 feet, 10 inches, but was unable to clear the bar a quarter of an inch higher in the three attempts, although on the third trial it seemed as if a breath of air from nowhere blew the bar off the standards.

In the medley relay that was run against time the Cadillac A. C. took first place by a margin of over 10 seconds from the team representing the Y. M. C. A. Highland Park Junior college was third and the Detroit Institute of Technology was fourth. The time of the winning team was 8 minutes and 17 1/5 seconds for the mile and seven-eighths.

KNIGHTS OF NIBLICK HEAR CALL OF LINKS

Public and Private Courses Have Heavy Play Over Week-End; Other Links Will Open Next Week.

Golfers in the Detroit district were not reluctant to take advantage of fine weather conditions Sunday and were out bright and early on fairways and greens of many courses.

Like last Sunday public and semi-public courses received the heaviest play although private links were well sprinkled with foursomes and twosomes all day. All courses are reported in good condition for this season of the year.

Palmer Park again led the list with around 500 players, Hawthorne Valley had a similar number while

other public courses reported the heaviest play of the season.

At the Detroit Golf club more than 50 members were on the links; the Country Club of Detroit reported 60 players while more than 30 were on the terrain at Lochmoor. All other private clubs reported from 20 to 60 players.

Next week will see the opening of several more public courses including Belle Isle, Bob-O-Link, Eastwood Hills, Hickory Hills, Pontiac Municipal, River Rouge and Woodlawn. Others will follow in rapid succession, depending on weather conditions.
