

OTTAWA MEN MAKE TOTAL OF 6 POINTS

Union and South Each Have
Five; Cook Cops in
Shot Put.

WINNING TEAM HAS 51½

Ann Arbor, May 10.—Grand Rapids schools did about as well as others in the state in the University of Michigan Invitational high school track meet Saturday morning, with the exception of Detroit Northwestern, which ran away with the majority of the points, piling up a total of 51½. Ann Arbor was second with 15 points and Toledo Scott third with 14½ points.

Ottawa Hills led the way among the three Grand Rapids schools entered with 6 points, gained through a second place by Tetro in the vault and a third by August in the javelin, while Capt. Walker Smith added a point by being fourth in the high jump. Tetro outdistanced any other Michigan vaulter, but lost first place to Lowry of Toledo Scott. The Ottawa vaulter cleared 11 feet to win his second place. Smith made a good leap in the high jump, being with two other men at 5 feet 9¾ inches.

Cook's Shotput Good.

Union and South each scored 5 points, Union getting its counters through the shotput of Cook in the preliminaries Friday, when he made 46 feet, 2¾ inches, a mark which stood through the final trials Saturday morning. Ross of South was nosed out of the points in the shot when he was just 2 inches short of fourth place.

South won three points when Joulin placed second in the discus toss at 111 feet, although he still was several feet short of first place. Schroeder annexed a third in the quarter mile to make South's total of 8.

Place in Prelims.

Probably the most noteworthy performance Friday from the Grand Rapids standpoint was the performance of a trio of quarter milers from South, Elliott, Schroeder and Barclay, who all made the grade in this grueling race. All finished second in their respective qualifying heats.

Cook of Union set the pace in the shotput with 46 feet, 2¾ inches and easily outdistanced the other competitors. Ross of South was the only other Furniture City boy to qualify in this event.

Johnson, South's best high hurdler, might have qualified in this event had he not drawn the fastest heat, the one wherein Ward, Northwestern Negro, stepped it off in 16.1 seconds and then also had the ill-luck to fall at the last hurdle. He was second when the mishap occurred. Hobart of Ottawa went to the semi-finals but couldn't do better than fourth in the semi-finals Friday.

Zack to 100 Yards.

John Zakerewski of Union was in the 100-yard final because he bested Heintzelman, of South by a scant half inch, to win second place in a semi-final heat. Heintzelman won his first heat.

Grand Rapids wasn't represented in the 220-yard dash because August of Ottawa, Heintzelman of South and Zakerewski of Union all finished third in the semi-finals. August nearly won second place and a qualifying berth, but the judges ruled Miles of Okemos had bested him. Heintzelman also narrowly missed out.

Barclay Loses Out.

The Furniture City lost out in the half-mile when Melvin Barclay of South loafed too long and then tried to pull up but couldn't make the grade in his heat. He finished third but only two places counted. Barclay had plenty of speed in reserve but didn't use it.

Rinkevitch of Union qualified in the low hurdles by winning both his heat and semi-final. He ran prettily.

The fact that all of the sprints were started from the new starting blocks bothered the boys no little. Most of them hadn't seen them before.
