

15 Records Fall In State Track Meet; Colts Repeat

Eighth Class A Crown Annexed By All-Around Northwestern Team—Class B Lad Runs Great Half-Mile

EAST LANSING, May 24.—(By AP)—The twenty-fourth annual State Interscholastic Track and Field meet passed into history here today with a brilliant exhibition that shattered 15 records.

After the last race had been run, Detroit Northwestern, Monroe, St. Augustine, of Kalamazoo, and Okemos high schools were declared the 1930 champions.

Northwestern's great all-round track team of nine entries closed its state competition by retaining the class A title it had won last year. It led the field at 37 1-2 points, while its nearest rival, Detroit Cass Tech, trailed with 20 points. It was the eighth time in the history of the annual meet that Northwestern captured premier honors.

Monroe blossomed into a state championship in Class B for the first time by piling up 27 points. Allegan, with its star, McNutt, a whole track team in himself, was second with 13 points.

Class B Runner Stars

St. Augustine, of Kalamazoo, also tasted the fruits of victory for the first time by nosing out Otsego, 14 to 13, in the Class C competition.

Okemos returned to its Class D championship of two years ago by making 34 points, with South Lake in second place with 27 1-2.

Tim Quinn, a rugged lad from Ludington, competing in Class B, rose to a dizzy height in the greatest achievement of the day when he ran the half mile in the sizzling pace of 1:58.8. The mark not only displaced the old Class B mark of 2:03.6, but also was better than the best all-time record for Class A competition.

Beaumont, Okemos' star, performed a similar feat by throwing the javelin 170 feet 5 inches compared with a Class D old mark of 160 feet 4 3-4 inches and a present Class B record of 162 feet 11 1-2 inches.

Old Record Broken

Weber, Mt. Clemons ace, gave his team its only five points and saved Class A from a non-record-making exhibition by hurling the javelin 171 feet 10 7-8 inches, more than two inches better than the old record made by Hornley, of Lansing Western, in 1929.

Class B records were established in the 880-yard relay, the half mile, discus and shot, Class C athletes made new marks in the half mile, 440, high jump, high hurdles, and discus, while Class D men equaled the former best efforts in the javelin, 220, pole vault, broad jump, and high hurdles.

Layor, of Lowell, changed history of eight years' standing when he heaved the discus in Class C competition to a new distance of 120 feet 2 1-2 inches. The old mark of 112 feet, nine inches was made by McClean, of Plainwell, in 1922.

CORNELL CREWS SWEEP REGATTA

Ithaca, N. Y., May 24.—(By AP)—Coach James Wray's Big Red Cornell crews swept Cayuga lake today as winners in the triangular regatta with Syracuse and Harvard. Cornell won all three races—varsity, junior varsity and freshman.

The most thrilling event was the varsity battle, Syracuse jumped into the lead and held it for the first three-quarters of a mile, with Cornell trailing and Harvard about a length behind.

At the mile, Orange and Red and White crews were tied, both rowing at a beat of 38. Shoemaker, stroke of the Wraymen, then called for a spurt and the Cornell crew hit it up to 42, and rapidly pulled away from their competitors.

The Cornellians were rapidly gaining at the one and one-half mile mark and increased their lead as they neared the finish line. The Red crew swept across the line one and one-quarters lengths in advance of Jim Ten Dyck's eight. Harvard trailed behind four lengths in the rear.
