

Handy Girl Nears World

Eastern Boys Win 2 Titles In Clash With West Siders

Yellows Pile Up Wide Margin To Lead In Girls' Competition; Jozwiak Star Performer For East Side Boys

A world's record was menaced and local tournament marks were soon spinning into the discard Wednesday afternoon when some 1,400 boys and girls from the city's two intermediate high schools met at T. L. Handy field for their fourth annual track and field championships.

The dazzling individual accomplishment of the matinee, staged under a sweltering sun that freckled the youthful faces of the contestants, was turned in by Miss Pauline McCullough, a Handy student, when she ran the 50-yard dash in six seconds flat, one-fifth of a second slower than the world's record established by Elizabeth Robinson at Chicago last July. Pauline, who is 15 years old, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert V. McCullough, 510 South DeWitt street.

A brisk breeze that swept the barren field intermittently partial-

flushed down the course to have her approach on the championship time clocked by a single watch. It was the fastest time ever recorded by a local girl runner and equaled the boys' mark set in this meet in 1927 and beaten last year by four Handy boys.

Miss Ortrude Haire, another brilliant speedster, ran the distance in one-fifth of a second slower than Miss McCullough to add strength to the day's challenge of the world mark.

The astounding performance of Miss McCullough was the high light in a program already abundantly laden with record-smashing events in which Eastern's boys combined all-around strength and brilliant single feats to defeat Handy for both the mass and individual titles in their competition. In the girls' battle for honors, the Yellows spread-eagled the field to win the crown hands down.

Eastern established a precedent in carrying away both boys' titles, for in the past three years the champions always had the individual title, with Handy ahead in mass play. This year, however, Eastern concentrated in one class to cop both.

New Type of Meet.

The girls were not competing on an inter-school basis, but rather were divided into four color groups, each embracing students from the two buildings.

The gallant band of Eastern boys dethroned Handy as perennial champions of the mass title, 350 to 275. The victory in the individual meet was even more pronounced, with Eastern successfully defending this crown with 265 points as compared with 110 for Handy.

Leading the championship drive for Eastern's ascendancy was a veteran campaigner, Pancratius Jozwiak, a star of the 1929 meet and back this time to shatter more marks. In the only class where this year's records were comparable with those established in the past, Class E for boys, three new marks were set, and the remaining two tied.

Jozwiak Is Star.

Jozwiak made two of the new records yesterday. He covered 33 feet, four inches in the hop, step, and jump, and broad jumped 17 feet, 10 inches. He also tied the hurdle mark, set by Haddock last year, of 6.6. Griggs, another young star of sporting the Eastern colors, equaled the 1929 dash figure when he negotiated the 50 yards in five and two-fifths seconds. Jaskiewicz, still another from the East Side, romped away with the shot-put when he chucked the eight-pound weight 47 feet, eight inches, nearly seven feet farther than the previous high mark.

In past the boys were split into three weight classes, but this year there were five, judged on the age-weight basis. Because of this, only the heavyweight marks of other years were on the same terms with those in Class E this year. The boys in each class competed in five events.

Eastern's strength in Class E, wherein Jozwiak, Griggs, Jaskiewicz, and other stalwarts were enrolled, decided the mass title for the challengers. The east siders scored 100 points to 25 for Handy in this class, and the 75 points difference there measured Eastern's margin of victory. Competition in the other four classes was close, with the schools even up in total points, Eastern won in Classes A and B, in each case by 25 points, and Handy did likewise in Classes C and D.

Class E Strongest.

The topside manner in which the Eastern E's forged to the forefront for the mass title was equally true in the battle for the individual banner. The champions romped off with 72 of the 75 points available in this department. The Eastern C's also took a big share of the individual points from Handy, grabbing 65 1-2 to 9 1-2 for the west siders.

In departing from the inter-school competitive angle for the girls the athletic directors for the two schools struck upon a plan which promises to develop into one of the most beneficial ever introduced in the athletic system of local schools. It's a play day arrangement whereby the play days of one school are given a more thorough opportunity of meeting and associating with the girls from the other school. It was handled rapidly and in extremely capable fashion and fully satisfactory to all who watched the several hundred girls go through their five events.

Yellows in Walkaway.

The girls sporting the yellow tags simply overwhelmed the three other colors, amassing a total of 419 4-8 points as against 210 for the Blues in second place. The Greens were third with 201 1-2, with the Reds a weak fourth, scoring 151 1-10.

Just as had been the procedure in other parts of the big program, the Yellows copped heavily in both the individual and mass meets. In going after the mass title the champions packed away 282 1-2 points against 130 for the Greens in second place. The Blues got 110 and the Red, 77 1-2. In the mass competition the Yellows had 137 3-10 as compared with 103 3-5 for the Reds, 100 for the Blues and 73 1-10 for the Greens.

Class C girls were the strongest supporters for the Yellow cause, scoring a grand slam for 100

points in the four track and field events, and adding 10 additional points for winning one of the two ball games.

Girls Get a Hand.

No particular emphasis was placed upon individual accomplishments as the best time or distance recorded in each event stands now as a record because of this type of meet being instituted with yesterday's matinee. However, bursts of applause greeted Miss McCullough as she sped down the unmarked lane, to challenge the fastest time the world has ever known in this event.

Miss Ellen Seebek, an east sider on the Class E Blue squad, was an easy winner in the basketball throw when she tossed the big oval three inches short of 72 feet. And Miss Dorothy McMullen, a Class D Blue, was given a big hand for covering the four hurdles in eight and three-fifths seconds.

FAVOR DIOLITE IN RICH DERBY

Old English Race To Attract Half Million To Epsom Downs Tomorrow

Epsom Downs, England, June 3.—(AP)—England's greatest sporting event, the derby, will be run here tomorrow before more than half a million spectators.

The nineteen probable starters in the great turf classic run annually since 1780, include two American entries, William Woodward's Scout Second and A. K. Macomber's Parthenon.

Parthenon is a decided outsider at odds of 100 to 1 against, but Scout Second, winner of the recent Newmarket stakes, is considered one of the best of the "Dark Horses," despite the fact that the betting odds on him are 25 to 1 against. A victory for Scout Second would give Mr. Woodward the distinction of owning the winners of both the derby and its Kentucky namesake, Gallant Fox, which galloped to victory at Churchill Downs, is owned by Mr. Woodward.

Tradition has placed Sir Hugo Hirst's Diolite in the favorite's role at 5 to 2 against. Diolite won the two thousand guineas and immediately became the choice for the derby, the ancient belief being that the winner of the two thousand guineas will win the derby.

The derby is run over a mile and a half course, with uphill and downhill grades, one bad turn at Tottenham corner with the finish on an uphill slope.

The record for the present course, measuring one and a half miles, 60 yards, is 2:31 2-5 established by call boy in 1927.
