

# OTTAWA AND UNION EACH SETS A RECORD

**Walker Smith Beats High Jump Height; Union 880 Relay Flashy; McNutt 'of Allegan Near State Mark in Shot and Discus.**

Every mark but one established at the first annual Indian relay meet a year ago went crashing in the second meet at Ottawa Hills Saturday and from the ruins of old marks two new all-time city high school records now stand out, one in the procession of Ottawa Hills and the other belonging to Union.

Capt. Walker Smith of Ottawa broke both the meet record and the city record in winning the high jump at 5 feet, 10 3/4 inches, the outstanding achievement of course being the eclipsing of the city mark, which has stood for 16 years. It was established in 1914 by Luther of Central at 5 feet, 9 3/4 inches and Smith was just an inch higher than the old Centralite.

The second city record fell in the final event of the day, the 880-yard relay, and still the record time was not good enough to win the event. Union can boast a city record in the half-mile relay, but Muskegon Heights holds the Indian relay record. The event was run in heats against time and the Heights won the first heat in 1:35.2, which was the fastest heat. Union won the second heat in 1:35.4 for second place, but in so doing broke the city record of 1:35.6, established by South in 1925. The South team that set the old mark was Heintzelman, Walters, Weston and Nelson. The Union speedsters Saturday were Yerman, Plechocki, Kinkovitch and Zakrzewski. Central's strong relay team, that finished second in the state meet, was third Saturday and yet was only two-tenths of a second short of the old city record with 1:35.8.

**McNutt Is Star.**

The outstanding athlete at the meet, however, was not a Grand Rapids man but Bernard McNutt, the one-man track team from Allegan High school. McNutt made two noteworthy marks in winning the shot and discus, passing the established city records as well as meet records in these events. His performance in the shot was most spectacular. In trying for a state record in three special puts after the regular trials McNutt came within 6 inches of attaining this end. He put the shot 51 feet 3/4 inches, which was 9 inches better than the Grand Rapids city record set 25 years ago by Joe Horner of Central and within 6 inches of the state class A high school record set by Kohler of Lansing in 1910. The put was the best ever made on a Grand Rapids field and the best McNutt ever has turned in.

The discus throw also brought McNutt a first place that was gained through a mark better than any ever made by a Grand Rapids man. McNutt tossed the disc 120 feet 2 1/2 inches. The Grand Rapids record in this event is 116 feet 9 inches, by Hugh Blacklock in 1913.

**South Unlucky.**

All of the track events brought new times Saturday, some of them being exceptional. If the South High school mile relay team had not had the misfortune to drop a baton it might have come close to national time in that event. As it was it clipped 7 full seconds from the old meet mark, even with the handicap of a dropped baton which had to be recovered. Red Elliott, Siki McGee, Marvin Barclay and Paul Schroeder ran on this team.

In the broad jump the defending champion, Miller of Hastings, was forced to take second, as Proctor of Benton Harbor beat the standing city record of Lester Nelson with a leap of 21 feet, 9 3/4 inches. Three jumpers were over 21 feet, 6 inches, Emery of Central coming within an inch of tying Nelson's city record in taking third place.

Cochet, beating back the challenge of America's veteran, Big Bill Tilden, Sunday won the French international hard court men's singles crown for the third time, 3-6, 8-6, 6-3, 6-1.

A little later, Mrs. Moody won the women's title for the third successive year by defeating Helen Jacobs of Berkeley, Calif., in straight sets with the loss of only three games.

Mrs. Moody won 6-2, 6-1 and conclusively demonstrated that she ranks by herself among the women tennis players of the world. Miss Jacobs had reached the final round by decisively beating the Spanish senorita, Ella de Alvarez, but she never had a chance against "Queen Helen." In the second set Mrs. Moody reeled off five games in a row and probably would have won at love had not she relaxed a bit after the gallery hooted a linesman's decision against Miss Jacobs.

Cochet played lazily through the first set which he dropped at 3-6 and Tilden was leading in the second at 5-3 before the French ace

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
