Four Records Are Broken at Inter-Class Field Meet Won by Seniors Wednesday

Four new records were set at the annual Ludington high school inter-class field meet at Custer park Wednesday afternoon. One mark was tied.

Tim Quinn, holder of the national scholastic record, set a new field mark in the hot-scale. Dennis broke the mile time. Bellie shattered the marks of the shot put and javelin and Roeder tied the high jump.

Quinn's Time Is Good

Quinn's 1:57.4 in the 880-yard dash will, doubtless, stand for many years to come at Custer park. His time Wednesday was two and one-fifth seconds lower than that at the national high school meet at Chicago, but considering the rough season over which he made the run, it is acknowledged one of his outstanding exhibitions. It was better than his time at Cadillac quadrangular and regional meets and just a bit slower than that at the state track meet at East Lansing. Last year he ran the half-mile in the annual high school class meet in a time of 2:05, bettering the mark of 2:18 by R. Kraft in 1918.

Dennis, promising sophomore, shattered a mark of 16 years standing in the mile event. R. Perry set the mile mark at 4:48 in 1914, but Dennis bettered this Wednesday with 4:32.

Bellie Breaks Record.

Walter Bellie broke P. Kraft's mark of 36 feet, nine inches, in the shot-put, made in 1918 and bettered Carpenter's mark of last year in the javelin, 120 feet and six inches.

Bellie heaved the 12-pound shot for a distance of 40 feet and threw the javelin 140 feet. One of his throws, 148-feet, was not allowed due to foul. Bellie's best mark in the javelin is 152, made at Cadillac last year.

Roeder came through in the high jump with a mark of five feet, six inches, to tie that set by Barnes in 1921. This mark is the best showing Roeder has made in competition. It is a half-inch better than the northern Michigan record.

The juniors pressed closely on the heels of the senior class athletes throughout the track meet, and the sophomores placed third with only a point to spare.

Final Scores Given.

Final scores are: Seniors, 65 1-2; juniors, 52 1-2; sophomores 12.

Expected results will be published later. The juniors won most events from the seniors, but the latter class amassed points on seconds and thirds.

The seniors won the shot-put, high jump, javelin, tug-o-war and the discus events while the juniors took the 100-yard dash, 400-yard run, half-mile, 200-yard event, broad jump, relay and tied with the freshmen for the pole vault. The sophomores won the mile.

A large crowd witnessed the meet, many attending especially to see Quinn run the half-mile.

SHARKEY TO FIGHT YOUTHFUL GERMAN TONIGHT IN OL' CITY

NEW YORK, June 12—(AP)—Little Ol' New York again was the big fight town today with its rush and roar as the background for a world's heavyweight championship match between the youthful German from Hamburg and the hope of the homebreds, a Lithuanian-American from Boston.

Tonight, some 45 minutes from the heart of Broadway, Jack Sharkey and Max Schmeling swap punches for 15 rounds or less, each seeking the same object—recognition as the heavyweight king and successor to Gene Tunney.

\$750,000 Goes to Charity.

With fair weather assured, close to 75,000 spectators, featuring a notable ringside assembly, figured to pay something like \$750,000 in the interests of charity.

Tonight's was the eighth heavyweight championship affair brought to some corner of the metropolitan acreage. It was the first, however, to involve two contenders for the title vacated two years ago by Gene Tunney.

Sharkey ruled the favorite to beat Schmeling's challenge.

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
