

MONROE WINS TRACK TITLE EIGHTH TIME

Monroe had not successfully defended his Southeastern Athletic Union title as a mile runner since 1922, but he did so today by a convincing margin at the annual meet of the Southeastern Athletic Union at the University of Georgia in Athens, Ga., today.

Monroe, who is now a member of the University of Michigan, won the mile in 4:28.4, breaking the record of 4:31.2 set by H. H. Hays in 1922. He also won the pole vault, breaking the record of 12 feet 6 inches set by H. H. Hays in 1922, and the javelin, breaking the record of 100 feet set by H. H. Hays in 1922.
