Rival Prep Teams Swamped as Northwestern Takes City Outdoor Championship With 54 Points—Cass Is Second With 24.

DAVIS CUP PLAY HALTED BY RAIN

Wood Easily Wins First Set Before Match Is Postponed.

Americans Need One Victory to Take Zone Title—Resume Sunday.

Montreal, May 23.—(A.P.)—Rain today halted play in the Davis Cup series between the United States and Canada with Young Sidney E. Wood, Jr., leading Dr. Jack Wright of Canada, one set to none in the fourth match. Play will be resumed tomorrow, weather permitting.

With only one more match needed to clinch the series, the final of the North American zone, Wood outmaneuvered the Montreal doctor to win the first set, which was finished in a drench of rain.

They had played four games of the second set, with the games divided, when the rain started to come down in earnest and play was halted. After an hour's wait when the skies showed no sign of clearing, the match and the final between Frank X. Shields and Marcel Rainville, was postponed until tomorrow.

The United States divided the first two singles matches Thursday, Wood losing to Rainville, and won the doubles encounter yesterday.

Whitney Wins 800 Run.

Ray Whitney, of Northwestern, indoor 800 champion, gained the outdoor title with a decisive sprint on the last quarter lap, passing Lavenash, of Western, the early pace-maker, just before the last turn. He just failed to withstand a desperate bid by the Western runner, who collapsed as he passed the finish mark. William Salinger, of Eastern, who was runner-up in the indoor meet and who had the second best time in the preliminaries, failed to place; White, of Cass, and Manders, of Northwestern, passing him in the stretch.

Frank Bolog, of Southwestern, lowered Northwestern hopes in the broad jump when he came through with victories to give the Prospector 10 points of the 14, which gave them third place in the meet. Bolog took the lead with the gun and maintained a clean advantage on his field all the way, winning by six yards from Hornel of Cass Tech. Hornel was pressed by Cogan of Northwestern in the final drive for the line. Bolog's time was 51 seconds.

In the broad jump the Prospector star leaped 22 feet 4 1/2 inches to beat William Frisay of Cass Tech, who had been conceded an excellent chance to repeat his victory of last year.

William Daley brought the only title into Cass Tech's camp with a final lap sprint in the mile. He followed the lead of Sullivan of Southwestern for three laps, and then stepped out on the last circuit to win by 10 yards from Karolinski of Northeastern in 4:45.4-5. Philias Kelley, Western threat, trailed the second place winner by five yards and barely lasted to withstand the challenge of John Szalwinski of Hamtramck.

Ed Pierce was the only Eskimo to uphold the glory that was Northern's in the days of Buck Hester. The slender pole vaulter cleared 10 feet 9 inches on his last try to avoid a tie for the city title with Bird of Southeastern.

Of the 17 schools entered Denby and Highland Park alone failed to score. Totals follow: Northwestern 54; Cass Tech 24; Southwestern 14; Western 9 1-2; Northern 9; Northeastern, Southeastern, Central, 6 each; Pershing 5; Hamtramck 3; Mackenzie 2; Cooley 1 1-2; U. of D., Redford and Eastern, 1 each.
