

SOUTH HAVEN TAKES CLASS B CHAMPIONSHIP

Monroe Moves Up From B Division to Win First Major Track, Field Meet

EAST LANSING, May 23.—Four new Michigan school team champions were crowned here Saturday afternoon when nearly 1,000 athletes participated in the finals of the twenty-fifth annual interscholastic contests.

Monroe High, champions of class B in 1930, won class A championship. South Haven clinched the class C crown, with Centerville taking class D honors.

Competition for high team honors was exceptionally keen today, with a fraction of a point deciding the class D champions, while the other classes also were very close. Monroe scored 28 points for class A honors; second, Grand Rapids Central, 26 points; third, Muskegon, 24; fourth, Kalamazoo Central, 20 1-3; fifth, Grand Rapids Union, 17 points.

South Haven collected 29 points to take class B first place with Grand Haven finishing second with 25½ points. Saint Joseph was third with 22½ points; Cadillac, 13 points, was fourth; Rochester, 12½ points, fifth.

Wins by Point

Algonac was able to nose out Paw Paw for class C honors by the narrow margin of 1 point. Algonac scored 23, Paw Paw 23, Ontonagon 18, was third; Caro 14, fourth; Lowell 11½, fifth.

In class D race Centerville clinched the state title by the scant advantage of twenty-five-twenty-eighths of a point over South Lake. Centerville scored 37 25-28 points to South Lake's 37. Litchfield was third with 18 points Comstock Park, 17½, was fourth, with St. Thomas of Ann Arbor, 11 1-6, in fifth place.

Two records were shattered in class A competition. Two in class B. Three marks fell in class C and one in class D for a total of eight new records established, with several others tied. A strong wind slowed up times somewhat.

Leading Scorer

McCorry, Ontonagon athlete, led the individual scoring with a total of 18 points. He won first in the class C shot put by making a new record of 45 feet 7 inches, took first in discuss, setting new record of 121 feet 7 inches and a second in both the javelin and broad jump events. Chase, South Lake athlete, was another bright light of the meet.

Quinn, national high school half-mile record holder, of Ludington, gave a brilliant exhibition in running the distance in 1:59.5 in the face of a strong wind.
