STATE MEET IS KIND TO CENTRAL ENTRIES

Capture Lion's Share of Individual Honors; School Is Runnerup with Union Ranking Fifth.

(By JOHN J. McGINNIS.) Although Grand Rapids Central fell just short of a state class A track championship when it lost out to the balanced Monroe High school team it stood out Saturday at East Lansing just as it did in the

regional meet at South a week earlier when South won the city title.

Central today lacks the state championship trophy but came home with a goodly supply of metalware, including a trophy for runnerup position in its class and a trophy for winning the relay. Central had the distinction of providing the first and second high individual scorers of the class A

dividual scorers of the class A meet, and holds gold medals for first place in four events, the most firsts scored by any class A school. It also can boast of a new all-time

mark in the 120 high hurdles, made by Pantlind on Friday.

Central led the field toward the close Saturday after its speedy relay team had bested the fastest in the state to win. With all events except the pole vault over Central was ahead by 3 points, having a total of 26, but had no man in the vault. Monroe High school's entry, Stein, won that event along toward 3 o'clock in the afternoon, long after others had been completed and nosed Central out of the championship by 2 points.
