

LUDINGTON'S FLASH RUNS IN 1:57.4; DENNIS IS FIFTH IN MILE RUN

STAGG FIELD, Chicago, June 13.—Tim Quinn, middle-distance runner of Ludington, Mich., successfully defended his national 880-dash championship here Saturday by winning the second section of the race in 1:57.4, two-tenths of a second slower than his Stagg meet time set last year, 1:57.2.

The event was a feature of the 27th renewal of the University of Chicago National Interscholastic track and field championships, which drew hundreds of high school athletes here from all parts of the country.

IS NOT HARD PRESSED.

Quinn finished by four yards ahead of Brothers of San Angelo, Texas, after covering a rain-soaked track. He was not hard pressed.

DENNIS PLACES FIFTH IN RACE

 finished last or sixth place in the 740-yard dash second race and Emery of Grand Rapids Central took fourth in the 440-yard dash, third race.
 Dennis of Ludington high school, a teammate of Quinn, placed fifth in the mile event.
 Amsden Oliver, Negro of Dayton, O., and a two-man track team representing Maine Township high, Des Plaines, Ill., divided top honors.
 The two-man team, Bob Kenpicoit and Marsh Miller, won the meet by amassing 31 points. Oliver set a new world prep record for the 220-yard low hurdles, winning with ease in 23.5 seconds.
 Other individual title winners were Vincent Murphy of Cathedral Latin high, Cleveland, who took the high jump with a leap of 8 feet, 1/2 inch; William De Morris of Pineville, Ore., who threw the javelin 179 feet, 2 1/2 inches; O. D. Hunnicut of Cottonplant, Ark., whose 23 feet, 8 1/2 inches was good enough to win.
 The running broad jump, J. C. Petty of Kaufman, Tex., who threw the discus 135 feet, 2 1/4 inches, and Ralph White of Ellsworth, Kans., winner of the pole vault at 12 feet, 7 3/4 inches.
 Elwyn Dees of Lorraine, Kas., who tossed the 12-pound shot 56 feet, 5 inches; and Sam Hardin of Greenwood, Miss., who won a section of the quarter miles in 50 seconds flat.
Makes Excellent Time.
 Oliver's performances in both hurdles were as good as anything seen in the meet in recent years. The Lanky Negro star took the highs, by four big yards in 15.3, excellent time for the rain-soaked track. The situation was about the same in the low hurdles except that he lengthened his winning margin to nine yards. The old prep 220-yard hurdle mark was 23.8 seconds, set by James Payne of San Bernardino, Cal., in 1926. The former Staggs meet record was set in 1929 by Jack Keller, the Ohio State university sensation, who won both the highs and lows in the N. C. A. A., championships last week.
