

Leading ED TOLAN FAVORITE IN DASHES

Clever Police Team Meets Rivals from Four Cities

Headed by Eddie Tolan, short, gruffly colored boy whose speedy legs have carried him to world renown on the cinder path, a group of college and high school track stars will compete at the state all games Saturday afternoon in the invitational events that precede the fifth annual police field day.

These track brilliants, among whom are several who will undoubtedly defend the United States in defense of the Olympic crown at Los Angeles next year, will compete in four events, the 100 and 200-yard dashes and the 120 and 220-yard hurdle events. These special races are expected to furnish the chief thrills of the afternoon program, in which the urbanest Detroit police track team will compete against rival officers from Baltimore, Toronto, London and Montreal.

The man who entered in each race. In the dashes Tolan's chief opposition is expected to come from George Hutson, Denton University star who placed in the national intercollegiate at Philadelphia. Petros Glas, Jr., of Oklahoma A and M college; Bill O'Neil, University of Detroit's outstanding trackster, and Love Snowden, of Michigan State. Normal college other entrants are William H. McCormick of Notre Dame, Jesse Farkus of Ohio State, John Campbell of the University of Michigan, John Lewis of City college, Louis Hill of Western State and Willis Ward, former Detroit Northwestern star. Ward is also entered in the hurdle, where he is given his best chance to score. Although all these entrants are of excellent caliber, victory for anyone but Tolan will be most of an upset.

Amateur Threat to Seelman

Lee Seelman, University of Illinois hurdler and holder of the western conference championship, will have stiff competition in his fight over the timbers. Amosden Oliver, Dayton high school boy, who set a national junior record in the low hurdles at Lincoln, Neb., recently is figured to extend him in the 220-yard event, while other worthy rivals are Eugene Healy of Yale and Byron Grant of the University of Utah. Willis Ward, Amos Johnson of Gary, Y. M. C. A., and George Clark of the Illinois A. C.

Muscles Give Exhibition

Nineteen members of the Detroit police team have been declared in readiness for their big test of the year. Vic Luchinsky, former University of Michigan hurdler; Ross Erick, K. Goetz, William Strong and Ed Wittmacks are counted as the favorites. Luchinsky, who placed in the 100-yard dash in Detroit of points for the 40 and 800. Clark Haskins, 17-year-old, will head a strong group of entrants in the field event. A tug-of-war is also listed for the bluecoats.

Besides the track and field program, members of the motorcycle and police mounted squads will put on exhibitions.

The opening race will start at 1:30 p. m.

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
