## Grand Rapids Team Wins By Copping Final Event

Central Is Thirteenth, Northern Twenty-Second In Meet—Baker Takes First—St. Joseph, Caro, Centerville Annex Titles

**EAST LANSING, May 28.**—(By AP)—The blue ribbon of Michigan high school track superiority tonight flouted from the breasts of athletes from Grand Rapids, Ottawa Hills, St. Joseph, Caro, and Centerville.

The four schools won the state high school championships today in their respective classes in a competition that brought more than 600 individual stars to one field, representing some 113 schools.

Ten new records were written into the history of the meet by the athletes. Only one of the marks was in Class A competition. Class B stars established two new marks, Class C three and Class D four.

Ottawa Hills, entering only four men in the individual events and two extra stars for the relay, won the Class A title, noosing out Ann Arbor, 26 to 24, in a thrilling finish. The championship was decided with the relay, next to the last event on the program. Ann Arbor went into the event with a light lead over the Grand Rapids team but the Furniture City athletes won the event. Ann Arbor was forced into fifth place.

**Kalamazoo Park Way**

Ottawa Hills won its title largely through the doubling of its star, Ed Kalawart. He took a first in the high hurdles and broad jump for 10 points. Woodstra won the low hurdles, while Davidson finished first in the half-mile. Tantsi, of Ann Arbor, kept his team in the running and incidentally won the high point distinction of the Class A meet. He took first in the 100-yard dash, and thirds in the broad jump and the 220-yard dash for 11 points.

Steln, of Monroe, established the only new record in Class A with a leap of 12 feet, 9/16 inch in the pole vault. The old mark was held by Wilson, of Muskegon, for 11 feet 10 3/4 inches.

Flint Central's touted team was forced to thirteenth place, totaling but seven points. Hal Baker, Indian co-captain, showed his heels to all contenders in the first section of the 440-yard dash, running the distance in 1:24.4, for five of the markers. Howard Clark's fifth in the half-mile and Jimmy Johnson's fifth in the shot put accounted for the other Tribe points. Northern, of Flint, wound up in 22nd position. Tom Jordan's fourth in the second section of the quarter-mile accounting for the only markers.

St. Joseph, paced by the great work of Warmbain and Erickson, its two stars, took the Class B championship only after a great fight with Dowagiac for first place honors. St. Joseph scored 25 points to 18 by its second place rivals.

Warmbain won three firsts for his team and set one of the two new records of the day. He led the field in the high and low hurdles and had the best height in the high jump. The latter was a new record leap of 5 feet, 10 3/4 inches. Erickson set a new Class B pole vaulting record of 11 feet 6 inches.

Clare McDurmon, of Caro, led his team to the Class C state championship. A thoroughbred among the stars of the day, the Caro boy took firsts in the two hurdles, high jump, and broad jump, scoring 20 of his team's 28 points. His efforts were good enough to beat out the Kalamazoo City team which trailed in second place with 18 points.

McDurmon set one of the three new records in Class C. He ran the high hurdles in 16.9. The old record was 17 flat.

Heacock, of Almont, ran the mile in the new time of 4:42.1. The half-mile relay team from Kalamazoo State High ran the distance in the record time of 1:34.8.

**Centerville Only Reporter**

Along among the defending champions to repeat in the competition today, the Class D team from Centerville still held its head above the pack. The titleholders scored 24 points to 10 1/2 by South Lake in second place and 18 by McBain, which finished third.

New records were made in four Class D events. Brown, of Centerville, ran the high hurdles in the new time of 18.8. Doney, Mackinac City, put the shot to a new distance of 43 feet 5 1/4 inches. Elsinga, Ellsworth vaulter, leaped to a new height of 11 feet. The relay team of South Lake ran the event in the record time of 1:38.4.

St. Joseph and Centerville were the only champions which have won the title before. St. Joseph won its last title in 1927, while Centerville took the championship of the Class D division just year for the first time. Defending champions that were overthrown today were Monroe, in Class A, South Haven, in Class B, and Algonao in Class C.
