

OTTAWA QUALIFIES ENTIRE ENTRY LIST

Indians' Hopes for Capturing Meet Not Dimmed; Cold Weather and Wind Handicap; Local Sprinters Do Well.

East Lansing, May 28.—Although rival schools had an early lead in events completed in the morning, Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills' chances for a state track title were not diminished by happenings in the qualifying round. The Grand Rapids favorite qualified all its entries and early points were so divided that its chances were not hurt.

Kalamazoo Central and Pontiac came through strong in the high jump and shot put to lead the field at noon in class A. Kalamazoo scored 8½ points in the high jump while Pontiac was second with a total of 8¼ points in both events. Although Grand Rapids entries fell down in these morning tests, they were from schools not considered as title possibilities. Ottawa had no hope for points in either.

Dash Men Qualify.

Grand Rapids' candidates in the dashes came through the preliminaries with flying colors. Bresnahan of Creston, Dykehouse of Tech and Voorhels of Catholic all qualified in both the 100 and 220. No sensational time was made in any of the dash heats, due to cold and a head wind. Toward noon the prospects of better weather in the afternoon were improving as the sun came out, but it was believed the wind against the runners would continue to prevail.

Western Boys Shine.

In the lower classes schools from the Grand Rapids regional were doing well. Bobczynski of East Grand Rapids and Bergin of Lowell qualified in the high hurdles in class C while Wyman and Rose of Saranac did likewise in class D. In the 100-yard dash Ries of Ionia qualified in class B while Streeter of Rockford and Edwards of Williamston came through in class C.

The low hurdle qualifiers in class B included Damoth of Allegan and Pressor of Rockford won his heat in class C. Rose and Wyman, Saranac hurdlers, also made the grade in class D of this event. Another western Michigan town, Cadillac, nearly swept the shotput in class B, taking first, second and fifth for a total of 10 points in the final standings. Garn won the event with a put of 44 feet.

Central Jumpers Flyver.

Grand Rapids schools did not fare well in the class A events in which finals were completed Saturday morning. Central's high jumping squad garnered only ½ point when

SETS JUMP RECORD.

East Lansing, May 28.—(P)—Warmbein, star entry from St. Joseph High school, leaped over the bars Saturday to a new class B high jump record of 5 feet 10¾ inches, the only new mark established in the morning program of the state interscholastic track meet. The old record was 5 feet 9 inches, held jointly by Pritchard of Allegan, Powers of Mt. Pleasant and Williams of Hastings.

Browne and Labanowski tied for fourth with two others. South's shotputters were lost in the competition, Oatley of Creston being the only Grand Rapids place winner with a fourth.

The Central jumpers were late in arriving at the field and found the event under way with the bar at 5 feet 6 inches already. Without the benefit of a thorough warmup on a cold and rainy morning the Centralites were at disadvantage. Browne was far short of his mark in the regionals last week when he tied the Grand Rapids record at 5 feet 10¾ inches. Howell of Kalamazoo took first in the jump at 5 feet 8¾ inches.

Oatley Places.

South's shot-putting stars, Ross and Wisner, failed to get into the points. Fifth place went to Johnson of Flint Central at 44 feet 7 inches and neither of the two South men could reach this mark. Oatley, second to Ross in the regionals, gave Creston a fourth and 2 points with a put of 45 feet 11½ inches.

Grand Rapids schools led the way in the track preliminaries, however. Both Woodstra and Kalawart of Ottawa Hills qualified easily in the highs, Kalawart leading his heat in 16.8 to share the best qualifying time with Godfrey of Lansing Eastern. Woodstra and Kroeze of Central led their respective heats in the 220 lows, the Centralite having the best time of all qualifiers with 26.9.
