Nearly 5,000 Boys Begin Training for '33 Decathlon

Starting this week, between four and five cusered boys of the elementary and intermediate schools of Detroit, who have qualified as contestants in the 1933 Decathlon, will begin intensive training for this annual athletic test held under the auspices of the Health Education Department of the Detroit Public Schools. This is by far the greatest number of contestants ever entered, and exceeds by upwards of 1,500 the entry list for 1932.

This year's meet will be the nineteenth which has been held, and, as in past years, will be sponsored and financed by the Free Press. Vaughn S. Blanchard, director of health education in the Detroit Public Schools, will have charge of the event. nd boys of the ele-

The decentralizing of the event will enable thousands more to compete and at the same time solve one of the chief problems of other years, the matter of providing transportation for thousands of boys to Belle Isle.

Ten events comprise the decathlon, five of which will be held each of the two days. For boys of the Intermediate and senior divisions, these 10 events are chinning; 100-yard dash; standing broad jump; standing hop, step and jump; sing hop, step and jump; dip; running hop, step and jump, and running broad jump. In the junior division, the 50-yard dash and the baseball throw are substituted for the 100-year dash and shot put.

The broadening of the decathlon program for this year follows the postponement until 1934 of the huge Belle Isle Field Meet, also sponsored by the Free Press, which annually draws 30,000 contestants and 300,000 spectators to Detroit's island of the school year and the resulting need for both an economy of time as regards the school program and as regards the school program and and expenditure of effort on the part of teachers and pupils alike.

In contrast to decathlons of past years, the 1933 test will be held on two different days, Wanesday, May 3, and Thursday, May 4, and at three different locations simultane.

The pentathlon, a similar test for girls, consisting of five events, is scheduled for May 13. The decathlon is for boys only. Pupils have been training for both events for weeks. Those selected as contestants must score in trials at least the number of points needed for a bronze medal before being allowed to compete in the official test.
