

Hamtramck Captures First City Outdoor Track Title

Cosmos Win Four First Places in Outclassing All Rivals in City Meet

Hamtramck High School's track team walked away with the twelfth annual city championship Saturday afternoon at the U. of D. Stadium by scoring 41 4-6 points to almost double the score of its nearest rival, Southwestern, which furnished an upset in winning second place with 21 1/2 points. It was Hamtramck's first outdoor title.

Northwestern's Colts finished third with 17 1/2 points, a single point ahead of Cooley, which was fourth. The Cardinals had been picked to press the Cosmos for the title. Pershing High was fifth with 15 points.

The Cosmos, coached by Floyd Slocum, won first places in high hurdles, 100-yard dash, mile and the relay. They won four second places and picked enough third and fourth places to win in a walk. Every member of the Hamtramck team came through as predicted following the qualifying trials, and some members of the new championship squad won startling victories against heavy odds.

Upset in Century

This was true in the 100-yard dash. Williams, of Central, and Thomas, of Southwestern, were the heavy favorites before the meet to win first and second. But Ptaszki and Muckel, Hamtramck runners, led the way to the tape in the first event to give the winners eight points.

John Bush, Cosmos' young miler, turned in the most sensational performance of the meet, when he nosed out Ben Kanowsky, Cooley's great distance runner, at the tape.

The pace in the mile was set by Spencer, of Southwestern. He was 60 yards in front at the quarter

which he turned in .68. Bush and Kanowsky, running side by side, cut down Spencer's lead to 20 yards at the half-mile mark but Spencer increased it at the three-quarter post. Then Kanowsky started the sprint that had shaken off all prep competitors this season.

Bush dropped a pace behind and stayed there until the last straightaway, a stretch of about 120 yards. Then Bush sprinted. Neck and neck they straddled to the tape running even. Five feet from the finish Kanowsky faltered. Bush kept his stride and won by inches. The time was 4:54.4.

Mueller Is Beaten

This event was the second blow to Cooley's hopes. Previously Carl Mueller, Redford star hurdler, tumbled in a semi-final heat and was ousted, allowing the Cosmos to place three boys in the finals.

Luther Fredericks, of Eastern, won over his old rival, Bob Isenhardt, of Cooley, to take another first place away from the Cardinals. Isenhardt took the lead with the gun and tried to stay out in front. Fredericks, with greater experience, remained a pace or two behind and beat him to the top with a sensational 60-yard sprint down the finish.

Individual high scoring honors were split between Constantine Eizak, of Pershing, and Willie Henderson, of Southwestern. Eizak captured first in both the discus and shot put and Willie won both the high and low hurdle events handily. Eizak's mark in the discus was 120 feet 5 inches.

He was given three attempts to shatter the record of 123 feet 2 1/2 inches set by Huber, of Northwestern in 1926, and failed. Just for fun he heaved a fourth toss which was measured at 125 feet 2 inches. It was not recognized.

Albert King, of Pershing, who easily won the high jump with a leap of 6 feet 2 inches, attempted to shatter Willis Ward's mark of 6 feet 4 inches and failed in three attempts. Soft footing made championship performances almost impossible.

In the 220-yard dash Thomas, of Southwestern, and Mueller, of Redford, staged a pretty duel. The Prospector ace drew away near the finish and won by a yard. It appeared that Mueller had been slowed up when he fell in the hurdle trials.

Cosmos Take Relay

In the 120-yard high sticks, Willie Henderson was given the toughest competition of his career by Bill Hendley, of Hamtramck. Bill was off to a flying start and kept pace with the fleet Henderson until half

Hendley was taking the timber in better form and appeared to be a winner at the final barrier. He was two yards out in front, but Henderson's greater speed on the straightaway won the race by a nose.

The Cosmos sprang an upset when they won the relay in 1:35.8. The Cosmos were pitted against Cass. The race was decided by time. The Colts were second, third went to Cass and Central's team was fourth.

Eastern placed sixth with 8 1-2. Other scores were: Central and Highland Park each 5; Redford 3 1-3; Cass Tech 3; Northern 2 1-3; Western 2; Miller Intermediate 1 1-2. The latter points were scored by Mullen, who tied for third with Lucas of Eastern in the broad jump. Mullen, in the ninth grade, was rated as a high school freshman.
