FLINT AWARDED REGIONAL MEET

Lansing, May 21.—Nine regional

golf tournaments, sponsored by the Michigan High School Athletic association, will be conducted throughout the state on Saturday, May 27. It is expected that between 75 and 100 schools will send competitors to these tournaments which are being held in the following centers: Muskegon Heights, Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, Ann Arbor, Detroit, Mt. Clemens, Flint, Big Rapids and Marquette.

Competition in state association golf tourneys is conducted in two classes. Schools having an enrollment of three hundred or more competing in Class A-B; schools with an enrollment less than that figure participating in Class C-D. Qualification to the state meet, the following week-end, is dependent upon the number of entries in a class at a regional as follows: Four will qualify provided there were eight or more teams entered; three qualify if there were six or seven teams competing; four or five teams entered qualify two; and if there were three or less, one qualifies.

The state event will be held on the new University of Michigan course, Ann Arbor, on Saturday, June 3.

LANSING EASTERN WINS 5-A MEET

Ann Arbor, May 20.—(By AP)—Lansing Eastern High school won the Five-A conference championship track meet here today with a score of 50 5-8 points. Ann Arbor High was second with 42-2-3; Lansing Central third with 30, and Battle Creek fourth with 8 1-2 points. Jackson High school did not enter a team.
