CARDS SHOW OLD POWER; WALLOP PHILLIES; 10 TO 1

Hallahan Halts Foe; Frisch, Wilson, Medwick Lead Attack.

St. Louis, May 27.—(By AP)—Unlossing a powerful batting attack as of old, the St. Louis Cardinals buried the last place Phillies under an avalanche of hits today and took the second game of the series, 10 to 1.

The Cards pounded Phil Collins for 14 hits and eight runs in the first four innings, while Pickrel held the locals to four hits and two runs in the remaining four innings.

The Cards got six doubles and two triples. Frisch, J. Collins, Medwick and Wilson each made three hits, Frisch and Wilson hit two doubles each while Medwick got a double and a triple.

Bill Hallahan let the visitors down with eight hits. The Phils sole run was scored in the fifth on a double by Leo followed by Davis' single.

EAST LANSING, May 27.—(By AP)—Blue ribbons of Michigan interscholastic track supremacy today flaunted proudly in the hands of athletes from Kalamazoo Central, Birmingham, Buchanan, and Centerville High schools.

The four teams won championships in their respective classes the 27th renewal of the annual state high school track meet in the Michigan State college stadium.

In one of the greatest exhibitions of high school talent in the history of the meet, 15 new records were written into the meet books. Athletes representing Class C and D schools led in the record-breaking performance, setting six marks in each division.

Class B competition tonight had two new records while athletes in Class A, the highest of the meet, broke only one mark. One mark was also tied in Class B.

Saginaw Takes Second

It was a hard day on defending champions, only one of them retaining the laurels it captured a year ago. Little Centerville High school fought off competition in Class D to emerge in first place for the second successive year. It scored 23 1-3 points with Portage in second place with 19. Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills in Class A, St. Joseph in Class B, and Caro in Class C were the remaining defending champions to relinquish their crowns, the first two by overwhelming margins.

Kalamazoo Central, by virtue of its championship in Class A, stood out as the premier track team in the state outside the Metropolitan area. It ran away with the competition today by scoring 27 points while Saginaw Eastern finished in second place with 17 1-11 points. The Kalamazoo team placed first and second and led for third in the high jump for a tremendous advantage of 11 1-2 points in the one event. Ottawa Hills scored only 5 1-31 points.

Caro, defending the Class C title, was nosed out by Buchanan in a hard fight for premier honors, despite the prowess of its one-man track team, Clare McDurmon, who scored 17 1-2 points. Buchanan had 22 1-6 points in first place while Caro lagged with 20 5-6.
