Detroit Sends Five Stars Led by Leroy Dues

Strong Normal Team Is Entered in Big Chicago Meet

Michigan will be well represented in the National A. A. U. track and field championships, scheduled June 23 and 24 and July 1, at Soldier Field, Chicago. More than two dozen athletes already have been named to compete in the meet by Charles H. Brennan, Michigan A. A. U. secretary.

Detroit will be represented by five entries. Leroy Dues, City College track star, should be a place winner in the shot put with his school marks. About King of Portland High School will enter the high jump. He holds the City prep title in that event.

Ernest Green, versatile City College freshman, will be an entry in the freestyle, the grandly all-around test in which Jim McHenry and Harry Hollings gained fame. John Lewis, former Tartar star and a member of the 1928 Olympic team, will run in the 400-meter race.

Who will represent the Great Lakes Mutual A. A., a new organization composed of Negro athletes in Detroit? Arthur J. Silber, a former State indoor champion in both the running, high and broad jump, will compete in the sprint race.

Hurons Have Fine Group

Harry Watson, one of the best steeplechase runners in the country when he competed for the Michigan A. A. of New York, will be in the Michigan track delegation. He is now residing in Ypsilanti. Watson was runner-up to Joe McClellan for the Lafayette steeplechase title in the National meet of 1931 at Philadelphia.

Michigan Normal has a squad of eight entries, with the possibility of adding several others. Jim McHenry and Ray Leroy, the Huron star pole vaulters, will match their ability against other 15 and 16-foot vaulters. Eugene Lokky, the Frank Daily 400-meter hurdle champion, will be among the favorites in that event.

Tim Quinn, former prep star, and Russell May, a promising freshman, will be the Normal entries in the 800-meter run. Bill Gray, high distance ace, will enter the 1500-meter run, while Fred Glendon will vie with the high jumpers. Norman McHenry, a versatile freshman, will perform in the decathlon.

Spartans Send Relay Four

Leo Bartlett, of Union City, Mich., a member of the last two Olympic teams, will compete in the javelin throw. Warren State Teachers College will have an entry in the javelin in George Lersch, who won that event in the Central Interstate league meet this year. Two best quarter-centuries, John (Mac) Malins and Ralph Pfingst, complete the Western State entry, both running the 400 meters.

Michigan State will be represented in the 200-meter relay by a fast team composed of Otto Fongren, Wesley Hord, Don Harvey and Ken Warren. Fongren, a former Eastern High School star, also will run in the 400-meter event. Jack Hamner in the 1000-meter, and Edward Beaudoin in the 2000-meter steeplechase complete the Spartan entries.

University of Michigan, which is sending a strong 16-man team into the National Intercollegiate at Chicago this week-end, may not try for A. A. U. team honors, although there is a possibility that the Wolverine will send about four men to make bids for individual titles. University of Detroit may also be represented by a small delegation.
