

Cosmos Grab Track Crown

Beat Out Eastern in City League Meet

Hamtramck High School captured the team championship and new records were established in the discus and half-mile Saturday afternoon in the fourteenth annual City League outdoor track meet at U. of D. Stadium.

The Cosmos garnered points in nine of the 13 events to win with 31½ points. Eastern, the defending champion, finished second with 26 points, Cooley was third with 14 and Central fourth with 13.

Other schools scoring points were Northwestern and Southwestern, 12 each; Southeastern, 11; Western, 8½; Miller, 8; Redford and Denby, 2 each; Pershing, Highland Park and Mackenzie, 1 each, and Cass Tech, ½.

Bob Scott, of Cooley, in the discus, and big Ulysses Amos, of Northwestern, in the half-mile, set new marks. Scott, an all-around athlete competing in his last high school meet, tossed the discus 127 feet 4 inches on his last throw. The old mark of 123 feet ¾ inches was set by George Huber, of Northwestern, in 1929.

Amos came from behind in the last 70 yards of the race to defeat Harold Ray, of Hamtramck, by a good 10 yards in 2:00.2. The old record, 2:01.4, was set by Lawrence Jeffries, of Northwestern, in 1932. Amos, a big boy with a long stride, easily pulled away from the diminutive Ray in the last 50 yards.

Willie Henderson, Southwestern's good hurdler, and Bernard Lucas, of Eastern, both competing in their last high school meet, tied for individual honors. Henderson won both the low and high hurdles, while Lucas took the high and broad jump.

Henderson defeated Jim Knight, Hamtramck's best hurdler, to win both events. The Southwestern star won by a good five yards in the high timbers as Knight tripped over the last hurdle and was lucky to place second. Henderson edged out Knight by a yard in the low hurdles.

The meet was a nip and tuck affair between Hamtramck and

Eastern and the final result was not determined until Hamtramck won the last event on the program: the half-mile relay. Hamtramck won this relay from Eastern by three points, although the second Eastern runner, Louis, fouled Jim Knight by crossing lanes directly in front of the Cosmos star on the second lap of the event.

Hamtramck came within one-fifth of the city record despite the foul, being clocked in 1:23.8. If Louis had not fouled Knight the Cosmos star of the relay, James C. Cullen, would have set another record.

It was McMullen and Demas who really won this event for Hamtramck. When McMullen took the baton from Knight Hamtramck was a poor fourth, eight yards behind Cullen. McMullen made up for this and gave Demas a new lead in the lap. Demas added a yard to this margin and by out-pacing Jack Prine, the Eastern anchor man, Eastern finished second but was disqualified. McMullen was the hero of the Hamtramck victory. Besides his great performance in the relay the time-keeping Cosmos won the quarter-mile and two-lap track to 1:12. This is two-fifths of a second slower than the city record set by Johnny Lewis, of Northeast Cold Field track. McMullen was a good eight yards in front of Bob Neal, of Central, at the finish.

The relay and the quarter-mile were the only events in which Hamtramck took first place, but the Cosmos 10 qualifiers appeared enough seconds, thirds and fourths to defeat Eastern. The Indians won three first places.

Eastern really got its championship in the 100-yard dash when its best sprinter, Jack Prine, got off a bad start and finished fifth, all out of the points. Prine made up for this by winning the 200-yard dash in 22.4, but this wasn't enough. Morris Sherwin, of Miller, took the 100 in 21.8 and finished second in the 200.

Wilfred Spencer, of Southeastern, finished an unimpressive year in the mile, winning by a 20-yard margin from Evelyn Johnson, of Northeastern, in 43:2. Spencer was in front all the way and easily pulled away on the last lap. Evelyn Johnson, of Western, was another high individual success, winning the shot put and placing second in the broad jump.
