# A. A. U. Indoor Track Carnival Set for Feb. 18

## Will Be Held in Yost Field House; Important Because of the Olympic Games

Michigan's annual indoor A. A. U. relay carnival will be held Tuesday, Feb. 18, in the Yost Field House at Ann Arbor, George W. Graves, president of the Michigan A. A. U. announced today.

Announcement of the date and the details of the meet were held up

because of difficulty over financing and scheduling the meet, which is regarded as highly important this year because of the approaching Olympic Games.

### THEY'LL RUN IT

Lloyd W. Olds, track coach at Michigan Normal College in Ypsilanti, is general chairman of the State committee, with Ralph H. Young, athletic director at Michigan State College; Towner Smith, track coach at Western State Teachers College at Kalamazoo, and C. B. Hedgecock, athletic director at Northern State Teachers College at Marquette, as regional directors.

The A. A. U. is making a special effort this year to get representation from every section of Michigan to get a line on all Olympic possibilities in the state.

The meet at Ann Arbor will be the third relay carnival which the state A. A. U. has put on. Mile relay events will be arranged for high schools, colleges, normal schools and the speedy University of Michigan mile relay team will be pitted against a picked opponent in a special race.

### AFTER PITT RUNNERS

An effort is to be made to get the University of Pittsburgh, which has four first class quarter-milers, to send its mile relay team to Ann Arbor to run against Michigan, which will be represented by the quartet that ran the mile relay in 3 minutes, 15.4 seconds last year at the Conference meet at Ann Arbor. This is the fastest mile relay ever run east of the Rocky Mountains.

A series of special events is also planned. There will be dash events, high and low hurdles, mile and two-mile runs, high jump and pole vault and the shot put.

The meet last year drew an entry list of more than 300 high school and college performers and was the largest indoor relay meet in the Middle West. At least 500 are expected to enter this year.

## Visitors Win Three Titles

### Detroit Boxers Take 13 Diamond Belt Bouts

Detroit amateur boxers won all but three of the 16 bouts in the finals of the Diamond Belt tournament that drew more than 13,000 persons to Olympia Friday night. And only three of the 16 bouts ended in knockouts.

Two veteran lightweights furnished the best match of the program. Al Kilpatrick of the Chrysler A. C., and Lonnie Wright of the Mt. Olive A. C. were more experienced than most of the contestants. Wright was the oldest of the 32 boxers. He is 24 years of age. Kilpatrick knocked Wright down twice in the first round but the Negro was still on his feet throwing punches at the end of the third round.

George Kell of Windsor, in the novice flyweight class; Johnny Barbara of South Bend, a welterweight, and Lew Bellinger of Flint, a heavyweight, were the winners from outside Detroit. Kell and Frank Egan of the Hudson A. A., were the youngest winners. They are 16 years of age.

Knockouts were scored by Milton Shivers and Paul Favors of Mt. Olive A. C., and John Kroger, Chrysler A. C., were the knockout winners. Shivers stopped Joe Zanchelli of the Briggs A. A. in the open middleweight class in the third round. Favors dropped Connie Elzak in the novice light-heavyweight division in the second round. Kroger knocked out a teammate, Frank Matous, in the first round.

Mt. Olive A. C. won the team trophy. The Diamond Belt tournament was sponsored by the Detroit Times
