

# Monroe Wins Class A Track

## SOUTH IS RUNNERUP AMONG 30 SCHOOLS

### Paw Paw, in Class C, Only Successful Defender; Birmingham, Onekama Win; Four New Marks Set.

Monroe High school, riding on the prowess of its sprint and hurdle entries, who accounted for 32 of its 30 1/2 points in the total, ran up a comfortable margin over Grand Rapids South and other rivals to win the class A state track meet at Houseman field Saturday. South finished as runnerup with 23 points to 22 1/2 for Jackson.

Another local school, East Grand Rapids, came in with the leaders in class C, finishing third behind Paw Paw and Lowell. East's success was due to the most remarkable showing by any individual in any class as Don Wilber, entered in four events, gained two firsts, a third and a fourth for a total of 21, all of the points marked down for East in the official ledger.

Paw Paw was the only school to make a successful title defense, nosing out Lowell by 6 points, 29 to 23. In class B another team from the eastern section came through, Birmingham beating out the 1935 champion, Niles, 37 1/2 to 28. Allegan, counting strongly with its sprint ace, Conlee, was a close third with 25 points. In class D the battle was closest, Onekama edging out Lakeview of St. Clair Shores 46 to 43, with Napoleon right on the heels of the two leaders with 39 1/2 points.

### Dykhouse Wins 220.

Grand Rapids schools did not fare badly, South gaining almost as many points as it had been figured to take, while Davis Tech came to the front for seventh place among the 30 class A schools entered, chiefly through the efforts of Pete Dykhouse, who won the 220 and was fourth in the century. Wright of Tech made a fourth in the shot while Dondzilla gained a fraction of a point by tying for sixth in the vault.

South had a lead in the early events, with 9 points in the high jump and 4 in the shot, thanks to Self, McDonald and Savage, but found a fight on its hands when the Monroe speedsters opened up in the high hurdles and the 100. Monroe grabbed a total of 16 points in the first two events of the afternoon's program, wiping out the lead South had piled up during the morning competition.

McDonald of South won third in the high hurdles but from then on the Trojan gleanings were sparse. Hansma could do no better than fifth to add 2 points in the mile. Gillesse ran a good 880, but was pocketed around the last curve and could not overtake the two boys ahead of him in the final stretch, winding up third behind a pair of Lansing runners. The time was good, 2:03.5, about as fast as Gillesse could have been expected to do without the unfortunate pocketing on the last 200 yards. His points were the last ones recorded by South.

### Locals Cop Two Firsts.

Grand Rapids won two firsts, the one taken by Dykhouse in the 220, and another by Keegstra of Central in the high jump. The latter surprised by taking the two South stars, McDonald and Self, in that event. Bartnick of Catholic finished fourth in the 220 and Lemanski of that school added a point by taking fourth in his section of the 440. Jack Glazier of Creston was third in the same section, Jack Amon of Union won fifth in the 100 and Union gained a half-point by a tie for sixth in the relay, being the only local relay team to break into the points. Monroe capped its showing with a sensational 1:32.5 relay, within 2 1/2 seconds of the state record, and did it after meeting the handicap of one dropped baton on an exchange.

A strong wind at the backs of runners on the straightway worked against acceptance of a number of record-breaking marks in the hurdle and dash events, with the result that only one track mark was bettered, together with three in the field events. Mazey of Middleton started it in the morning. Attired in home-made tennis and tennis shoes, he vaulted 11 feet 5 inches in class D for the best height of the day in any class and a new D record, topping the old mark by a half-inch. In the afternoon Tycocki of Lansing Central made the only new class A record of the day in broad jumping 22 feet, 11 3/4 inches to beat by slightly more than an inch a record that had stood since 1928.

### Holderman Cracks Mile Mark.

The best mile of the afternoon in any class was contributed by Eddie Holderman, the boy who came all the way from Escanaba in the upper peninsula to try for the class B mark. He clipped it by three-tenths of a second, doing 4:34.4. Another B record fell when Kinsey of Plymouth made what is perhaps the best prop shotput mark ever witnessed at Houseman field. He boosted the weight 50 feet 8 3/4 inches, beating the old mark by nearly two feet. This throw is better than the 30-year old Grand Rapids high school record made by Joe Hornor in 1905.

## UNKNOWN PRO WINS METROPOLITAN OPEN

Mamroneck, N. Y., May 25.—(AP)—Byron Nelson, a 24-year-old former railroad clerk who has been a professional for only two years, came from behind to win the Metropolitan Open golf championship Saturday with a total of 283, two shots ahead of Craig Wood, New York, and three ahead of Paul Runyan, White Plains.

Two shots behind at the start of the day and one back when he started on the last round, Nelson shot a 72 in the morning and followed it with a 71, while the favorites fought unsuccessfully a high wind.

Gene Sprazzen, who had two 69's in his first two rounds and was tied with Paul Runyan for the lead at the start of final play, shot a 76 in the morning and an 81 in the afternoon to finish in a tie for seventh place with Vic Ghezzi, Deal, N. J.

## New Record Hung

### EIGHT PLACES OPEN FOR 500-MILE TEST

### Rain Stops Qualifying Runs Sunday; Nine Get in Saturday.

### 33 CARS WILL START

Indianapolis, May 25.—(AP)—Qualification trials for the 500-mile automobile race to be run here next Saturday went into the final stages Monday with almost a score of drivers fighting for the eight remaining spots in the starting lineup.

Rain stopped all qualifying runs Sunday, but several of the drivers expect to make their runs Monday. Although most of the star drivers already have qualified, several, including Louis Meyer, of Huntington, Calif., twice winner of the race; Deacon Litz of Dubois, Pa.; Mauri Rose of Dayton, Ohio, and Fred Frame of Los Angeles, another previous winner, have yet to win their places among the starters.

Only 33 cars can start the race and if more than that number qualify the cars with the slowest qualifying times will be eliminated. The plan is to continue the trials through Thursday and then the big 2 1/2-mile track will be closed for its annual scrubbing until 10 a. m. Saturday—the official starting time for the race.

Sixteen drivers qualified a week ago Saturday and Sunday and nine more made the grade last Saturday. They were Al Miller of Detroit, Chet Gardner of Long Beach, Calif., Billy Winn of Detroit, Frank McGuirk of Los Angeles, Frank Brisko of Milwaukee, Ralph Hepburn of Los Angeles, Johnny Seymour of Detroit, Doc Williams of Franklin, Ind., and Overton Snell of St. Louis.

## White Cockade Defeats Brevity In Withers Mile

New York, May 25.—(AP)—Ogden Phipps' White Cockade, an outsider in the betting, Saturday defeated J. E. Widener's Brevity by two lengths in the sixty-first running of the Withers mile at Belmont Park. The Wheatley stable's Teufel, stablemate of the winner, was third in the field of 10 three-year olds.

Brevity, making his first start since losing a head decision to Bold Venture in the Kentucky Derby, was the 3 to 5 choice of the crowd of 25,000. In contrast the entry of White Cockade and Teufel was almost overlooked in the wagering, being held at 15 to 1 to take the purse of \$18,200.

## Sunday Saw 119,000 At Baseball

New York, May 25.—(P)—Who ever said major league baseball was losing its grip on the fans? An eight-game program Sunday which had little out of the ordinary in its makeup drew approximately 119,000 fans through the turnstiles.

The crowds ranged from 26,200 at Boston, where the Senators trimmed the Red Sox, down to 7,604 for the Rees-Dodgers game at Brooklyn.

At St. Louis the largest crowd of the season, 22,500, turned out to see the Cardinals lick the Cubs. At Philadelphia, where the Yankees scored a record-smashing 25-2 triumph over the Athletics, only 8,000 were on hand after more than 24,000 had witnessed Saturday's doubleheader.

Even Connie Mack, the A's manager, didn't hang around to see the Sunday slaughter. He was in Bridgeport, Conn., attending memorial services for an old friend, Michael J. Flanagan, who died recently.

Other crowds were Phillies-Giants, 18,616, and Pittsburgh-Cincinnati, 11,526, for a total of 60,246 in the National league. In the American loop Detroit-Cleveland drew 16,000 and St. Louis-Chicago 8,500 for a total of 58,700.

## YANK GOLFER WINS IN BRITISH MEET

St. Andrews, Scotland, May 25.—(INS)—Dick Chapman of Greenwich, Conn., drew first blood for the United States Monday in the first-round matches of the British amateur golf championship, defeating K. W. Grieg of Great Britain, 1 up.

The veteran British player, Cyril Tolley, defeated T. Dennis Boardman of South Hamilton, Mass., 3 and 1.
