Monroe High school, riding on the prowess of its sprint and hurdle entries, who accounted for 32 of its 3912 points in the total, ran up a comfortable margin over Grand Rapids South and other rivals to win the class A state track meet at Houseman field Saturday. South finished as runnerup with 23 points to 2214 for Jackson,

Another local school, East Grand Rapids, came in with the leaders In class C, finishing third behind Paw Paw and Lowell. East's success was due to the most remarkable showing by any individual in any class as Don Wilber, entered in four events, gained two firsts, a third and a fourth for a total of 21, all of the points marked down for East in the official ledger.

Paw Paw was the only school to make a successful title defense, nosing out Lowell by 6 points, 29 to 23. In class B another team from the eastern section came through, Birmingham beating out the 1935 champion, Niles, 37½ to 28, Allegan, counting strongly with its sprint ace, Conlee, was a close third with 25 points. In class D the battle was closest, Onekama edging out Lakeview of St. Clair Shores 46 to 43, with Napoleon right on the heels of the two leaders with 39½ points.

Monroe grabhed a total of 16 points in the first two events of the afternoon's program, wiping out the lead South had piled up during the morning co.npetition.

McDonald of South won third in the high hurdles but from then on the Trojan gleanings were sparse. Hansma could do no better than fifth to add 2 points in the mile. Gillese ran a good 880, but was pocketed around the last curve and could not overtake the two boys aboud of him in the final stretch.

Grand Rapids won two firsts, the one taken by Dykhouse in the 220, and another by Keegstra of Central in the high jump. Mazey of Middleton started it in the morning. Attired in home-made trunks and tennis shoes, he vaulted 11 feet 5 inches in class D for the best height of the day in any class and a new D record, topping the old mark by a half-inch. In the afternoon Tycocki of Lansing Central made the only new class A record of the day in broad jumping 22 feet, 11% inches to beat by slightly more than an inch a record that had stood since 1928.

Holderman Cracks Mile Mark.

The best mile of the afternoon in any class was contributed by Eddle Holderman, the boy who came all the way from Escanaba in the upper peninsula to try for the class B mark. He clipped it by three-tenths of a second, doing 4:34.4.
