Miller of Creston Cops High Jump, Leonard of Tech Half Mile; South Showing Disappoints.

represented by the boys among the meet leaders. Tech was the top school of the city group, ranking fifth with 13 points, while Creston and Ottawa Hills, with 11 points, shared a four-way tie for eighth place. Monroe, the defending

champion, nosed out Saginaw by a point for the title, with Muskegon third, those being the only schools to make more than 20 points. The meet was decided on the final event the roles in which
