

# RECORDS MAY FALL THERE SATURDAY

## Ward of South Hurdle Favorite; Bartnick, Wright Get Chance.

### SEVEN STRONG TEAMS

East Lansing—(A)—The annual attack by high school athletes on state interscholastic track and field meet records will be made Saturday when several hundred high school athletes descend on the Michigan State college track for the twenty-first annual running of the state interscholastic track and field meet.

One hundred eighty schools will be represented by 690 boys who won out in sectional elimination meets.

Monroe, class A defending champions, is figured to finish high in the running this year as the result of its victory in the Border Cities regional with a total of 63 points. Serious opposition, however, is expected to come from Muskegon High, topheavy winner of the Kalamazoo regional, and from Saginaw, Flint, Central, Grand Rapids South Lansing Central and Jackson.

#### Records in Danger.

Some records are expected to go by the boards. A fast time in the 100-yard dash seems a certainty. Soper of Muskegon, Bartnick, Grand Rapids Catholic, and McGhee of Pontiac all have stepped the distance in :10.1 in the regional meets.

Ted Tycocki of Lansing Central will be out to break his record of 23 feet 1¾ inches established in the 5-A regional meet last week at Ann Arbor. Tycocki's chief opposition will come from Ira Kepford of Muskegon, who placed first in the Kalamazoo regional meet.

The same Kepford is regarded as a big threat in the hurdles. His time of :25.8 for the 200 low hurdles set a new meet record. Vance Ward of Grand Rapids South bettered the state time in his regional meet at 23.4.

In the half mile run Leopold Kulikowski of Muskegon Heights appears the best bet. Kulikowski has negotiated the distance in 2:04.

#### Strong 440 Field.

The 440-yard dash should provide interesting competition. Norman Fossum of Lansing Central and Kovarick of Muskegon Heights have run the distance in about the same time, together with Cooley of Jackson, Charon of Grand Rapids Central and Boulet of Grand Rapids Davis Tech.

In the mile race a duel is expected between Hoffman of Ottawa Hills, Grand Rapids, and Keating of Jackson. The former won his regional title in 4:43, while Keating was first at Ann Arbor in 4:43.6.

Lack of outstanding performers in the field events keep most marks out of danger. Wright of Grand Rapids Davis Tech, Ted Denise and Bob Dewitt of Lansing Central, Anderson of Royal Oak seem the leading contenders in the shotput ranks.
