Cosmos Concentrate on 3 Races and Win

Hamtramck Scores 21 of 42 Points in 440, Half and Mile to Take 3rd Prep Track Title in Row

Floyd Stocum, Hamiramck High's track coach, was discussing the prospects of his team winning its third successive outdoor track championship the other day. "We'll win the meet if we can take 21 ... points in the quarter, half and the mile," he said. "Give us those points and the other events will take care of themselves."

Hamtranck scored exactly 21 points in the three races at U. of D. Stadium Friday. It added 21 more in the remaining 10 events, finishing with 42 points to 33 for Redford, the runner-up.

Behind the two leaders were Cooley, 22 points; Southeastern 18; Northwestern 6: Pershing 6: Cass 5: Denby 3: Northern 3: Central 3,

and Southwestern 2. Hamtramck stook only three firsts, while Redford was first in five events. The remaining first places were divided between Cooley with three, Cass one and Southeastern one.

SCORE IN 11 EVENTS The defending title-holders scored

in 11 of the 13 events, taking first and second in the 440, first and third in the mile, first and fourth in the half-mile, second and third in low hurdles, second in the 100yard dash, second in the high jump, third in the high hurdles, fourth in the 220, third in the discus and second in the relay. They did not place in the broad jump or pole vauit. Redford took first and second in

the 220, first and third in the 100. first in the pole vault, discus and relay, but took only two other places, third in the shot, and fourth in the broad jump. Bob Abbott of Redford was the
