Miller, Hurdler, Sets Record in Trial Heats

Marks Disallowed, However, Because of the Wind; Lawson Scores Points in Shot for Ottawa.

East Lansing—Paced by George Doran of South and Gordon Miller of Creston, Grand Rapids entries in the state interscholastic track and field meet here Saturday afternoon went into the concluding phase of the prep classic with high hopes. Doran tripped home for firsts in both his 100 and 220-yard dash qualifying heats, while Miller, in taking firsts in both high and low hurdles qualifying heats, set new records in each. The marks, however, were disallowed because of the light wind that arose at intervals to follow the heavy showers that fell near noon.

Tony Kohan of Union also qualified for the high sticks, while Lawson of Ottawa in placing third in the shot finals, gave the Indians four points. Mitchell, a heavy pre-meet favorite, failed to place any higher than sixth, accounting for South's one point. Peterson of East, placing first in one class C low hurdle heat, looked good as a possibility to count in the finals.

Western and northern Michigan prep tracksters opened the scoring with victories in the broad jump, pole vault and high jump.

Bergman of Charlevoix, aside from qualifying for both the high and low hurdles, also won the class C high jump with a leap of 5 feet 10 inches, while Beckering of Fremont took the pole vault in class B with a vault of 11 feet 6 inches. Schelb of Allegan won the class B broad jump with a leap of 20 feet 10 1/2 inches. He also placed second in the pole vault. Price of Belding wound up third in the event while Kessler of Belding took second in the class B broad jump.

Onkama Vaulters Wins.

Flaherty of Onkama took a first in the class D pole vault with Haupt of Whitehall a close second and Hauserman of Saranac fourth.

As the morning session came to a close, George Doran of South sprinted in for his second qualifying spin of the day, taking first in his 220 heat. His time was :21.8.

Locals Start Well.

Kohan of Union started the Grand Rapids entries off on the right foot by qualifying in the first class A high hurdle heat, running second to Bates of Flint Central's whose winning time of :15.1 was announced as a new state record. Miller of Creston followed to qualify in the second heat, placing first with the time of :15.1, tying the record set in the previous heat. Miller coasted in with a 3-yard lead and set the stage for the probable duel between himself and Bates in the afternoon's final event. Eight men qualified. Both heats were run in a light rain and with an absence of wind.

Bruce of Charlotte added his name to the class B list of qualifiers in the high hurdles as did Henry of Belding, who sailed in first in his heat with a time of :15.8. Turnipseed of Mancelona qualified for the C flight in the high sticks also. Turnipseed's mark of :15.8 in his heat smashed the old class C record of 16 flat previously held by Miller of Belding. His record failed to stand up, however, with Bergman of Charlevoix in the following heat skimming over the sticks in :15.6 for an even better mark. Beckman of Shelby and Wolf of Hart won qualifying places in the class C barriers.

Hurdlers Qualify.

In the class D high hurdles, Western Michigan representatives qualified when Norton of Saranac and Kretschman of Dimondale each won a place in the finals. Houseman of Saranac and Graham of Pentwater also placed in the following heat to stick in the running.

In the class A 100-yard dash, George Doran of South breezed in for a first in his qualifying heat for a 10.1 pace. Kruger of Ottawa also in the heat, was barely nosed out for a qualifying post. Note-tine in the following heat, also failed to make the grade, coming in fifth.

In the class B 100, Hoffman of Big Rapids won a qualifying place, running fourth in a 10.2 heat. Derby of Fremont also stuck in for the afternoon sprints, qualifying in a 10.3 heat. McNitt of Mesick copped the first of the class C 100 heat with 10.3. Plumhoff of Shelby and Helms of Mancelona also qualified in the following heat. Pant of Saranac and Edwards of Dimondale also qualified in class D.

In the class B broad jump finals, two west state boys, Schelb of Allegan, who started in the Hesslerman regionals last week, and Hessler of Belding placed one, two. Schelb's leap was 20 feet 10 1/2 inches.

Records Disallowed.

In 200-yard low hurdles prelim heat in class A produced a new record, not allowed to stand however. Bates of Flint Central set a time of :24.4 that was nullified by three and eighth-tenths-mile an hour wind. Miller of Creston breezed in for his second qualifying win of the morning, taking a first in his heat after topping the barrier in :22.7, the mark also being disallowed because of too much wind.

Henry of Belding came through for his second qualifying performance in the class B low hurdles, hitting a pace of :23.5. Quigley of Central also qualified in the class A lows. Rozelle of East Grand Rap-
