Bolt Seriously Injures Third Play in Kansas City Open Set Back as Tragedy Stalks the Course

Kansas City — AP — Over a course stalked by death from the sky 120 golfers, including many of the nation's elite, battled frayed nerves as well as par today in a curtailed 54-hole tournament for \$5,000 in prizes.

The picture of four still figures, lying in a drenching rain hard by the ninth green where lightning had tossed them was fresh in the minds of the sharpshooters.

Thirty-six players had finished their first round Friday when the bolt killed two spectators outright, injured seriously a third and caused the initial scores to be put aside in favor of a shorter competition.

All the victims were Kansas Citians. William D. Boyle, contractor, and Edward M. Crichfield, a credit manager, were killed. Thomas Cunningham was injured seriously. Lesten Allen, a bank employe, was knocked unconscious but quickly revived. Several others reported shock and minor burns.

Watching Horton Smith
The tragic interlude came shortly before 3 o'clock when most of the big name golfers were having a downpour. A crowd of spectators stood dripping near the ninth green to watch Horton Smith, Leonard Dodson of Springfield, Mo., and Leland Gibson, Kansas City, approach.

A sudden blinding flash, a deafening crash, and the crowd was milling about in the mud and water in gibbering confusion. Cries for help went up as four still bodies were sighted among a little, stunned group at the left of the green. The crowd surged forward, hesitated, then broke. Some of the braver edged on. Others, mostly women, turned in panicky flight.

Day's Scores Canceled

As white-faced, whispering men and women jammed the club veranda, Fred Corcoran, P.G.A. tournament manager who had stopped play immediately, announced the day's scores would be disregarded, and that the 72-hole tournament would be cut to 18 holes today and 36 holes Sunday.

The best in Friday's off the record scores was a 74 by Walter Riepen, St. Joseph, Mo., amateur. A majority of the players were in the 80's.
