igan and AAU track and field meet with an unparalleled display of might to take eight first places, the University of Michigan delegation Saturday held the meet title, displacing the defending Michigan State team as 10 records went by the boards under the Houseman field lights Friday night.

Charles H. Brennan, state AAU secretary attending the meet, announced that winners qualified for the National AAU's that will be held at Buffalo on July 2 and 3 when championships in track and field events will be decided. At that meet a crack squad of 75 picked athletes will be sent on a track junket around the world. Thirty will compete in Germany, 12 in South Africa, 10 at London, 8 in Italy and Greece, 7 in Sweden and 8 in South America.

The meet featured the abandonment of the metric system and the reversion to the old yardage system which contributed in part to the number of records broken. With high school events on the program for the first time in state AAU history all prep marks automatically went on the books as records.

To Bill Watson, the Wolverine track captain, went individual honors of the meet. Watson shattered

The tragic interlude came shortly before 3 o'clock when most of the big name golfers were braving a downpour. A crowd of spectators stood dripping near the ninth green to watch Horton Smith, Leonard Dodson of Springfield, Mo., and Leland Gibson, Kansas City, approach when the bolt struck.
