

# Ten Shattered by Crack Field; Winners Qualify for National Meet; Schwarzkopf Runs 4:17 Mile

Sweeping through the West Michigan and AAU track and field meet with an unparalleled display of might to take eight first places, the University of Michigan delegation Saturday held the meet title, displacing the defending Michigan State team as 10 records went by the boards under the Houseman field lights Friday night.

Charles H. Brennan, state AAU secretary attending the meet, announced that winners qualified for the National AAU's that will be held at Buffalo on July 2 and 3 when championships in track and field events will be decided. At that meet a crack squad of 75 picked athletes will be sent on a track junket around the world. Thirty will compete in Germany, 12 in South Africa, 10 at London, 8 in Italy and Greece, 7 in Sweden and 8 in South America.

The meet featured the abandonment of the metric system and the reversion to the old yardage system which contributed in part to the number of records broken. With high school events on the program for the first time in state AAU history all prep marks automatically went on the books as records.

To Bill Watson, the Wolverine track captain, went individual honors of the meet. Watson shattered

three state AAU records for a total of 15 points. He won the broad jump with a record leap of 24 feet 11 inches, and then followed by copping the discus with a throw of 153 feet 1¾ inches. Watson's third first came in the shot, where he put out a heave of 52 feet 6¼ inches for a third record.

## Schwarzkopf Stars.

Other Michigan firsts came in the two-mile, where Stone finished strong to set a 9:30.7 time in the event over a crack field; in the 220 low hurdles, where Kelley skimmed the sticks in :24.9; in the high jump, where Allen cleared 6 feet 3¼ inches, and in the mile and pole vault. Schwarzkopf's time in the mile event was 4:17 and established a new mark. Kingsley of Michigan took the pole vault with an official reading of 13 feet even, although the height had been announced as 13 feet 3 inches.

Outstanding among the marks shattered was Allan Tolmich's dazzling :14.7 burst over the 120-yard low hurdles in a qualifying heat. Later in the evening Tolmich edged out Kelley by a good five yards in the finals, but the time was :14.9.

Chappel of Western State contributed one of the most outstanding record-topping feats of the night when he raced home in the open 880-yard run in 1:54.9 for a new AAU mark. The Brelsford brothers, Clayton and Quinton, finished second and third.

## Relay Mark Broken.

Western State's mile relay team of Weise, Underwood, Fox and Chappell set another record into oblivion when it raced home in 3:25.8 to displace the old mark of 3:25.6 that had stood since 1930.

Carpenter of Michigan State and Bryant of Western State stood out in the dashes, Bryant winning the 100 with Carpenter second, and the order reversed in the 220.

South High took the special high school honors by a 1-point margin over Creston, winning out 13 to 12.

South cracked the 880 relay record locally by racing home in 1:31.5 for a new record and also set the 440 relay down for another with a :44.8 mark.

Ed Dudley of Catholic copped the high school mile, but the upset of the evening was the defeat of George Doran in the 100-yard dash. Doran was shaded at the tape by Rayford, running unattached from Muskegon. The defeat was Doran's first in his high school career.

# Bolt Kills 2 on Links

## Lightning Strikes Gallery Watching Kansas Open Match

Kansas City—(P)—Over a course stalked by death from the sky 120 golfers, including many of the nation's elite, battled frayed nerves as well as par Saturday in a curtailed 54-hole tournament for \$5,000 in prizes.

The picture of four prostrate figures, lying in a drenching rain by the ninth green where lightning had tossed them, was fresh in the minds of the sharpshooters.

Thirty-six players had finished their first round Friday when the bolt killed two spectators outright, injured seriously a third and caused the initial scores to be put aside in favor of a shorter competition.

## All Kansas Citizens.

All the victims were from Kansas City. William D. Boyle, contractor, and Edward M. Critchfield, a credit manager, were killed. Thomas Cunningham was injured seriously. Lester Allen, a bank employe, was knocked unconscious but quickly revived. Several others reported shock and minor burns.

The tragic interlude came shortly before 3 o'clock when most of the big name golfers were braving a downpour. A crowd of spectators stood dripping near the ninth green to watch Horton Smith, Leonard Dodson of Springfield, Mo., and Leland Gibson, Kansas City, approach when the bolt struck.

Fred Corcoran, PGA tournament manager who had stopped play immediately, announced the day's scores would be disregarded, and that the 72-hole tournament would be cut to 18 holes Saturday and 36 holes Sunday.

The best in Friday's off the record scores was a 74 by Walter Rippen, St. Joseph, Mo., amateur. A majority of the players were in the 80's.
